Capital Gains Tax is looming over us and it seems as though this government is still determined to take even more tax money from the New Zealanders.

Whangamata is full of second homes. Baches and a place near the beach are a big part of the kiwi way of life. They provide a relaxing getaway for many, especially those that live in bigger cities. If a Capital Gains Tax was to be implemented, it would hit these people and the property market in this beautiful town really hard.

We're told a capital gains tax would reap \$8.3 billion extra in its first 5 years from ordinary kiwis small business owners, farmers, bach and lifestyle block owners will be the main targets.

Labour claims this is about fairness - there is nothing fair about saying owners of small businesses, baches and lifestyle blocks will face a tougher capital tax cost than those who own multi-million dollar mansions in Auckland that are the primary residences of the super wealthy.

These taxes will kill our Kiwi dream. I've heard people refer to a capital gains tax as a 'bach tax' and that's certainly what it would be. If the primary home is exempt from capital; gains tax then people will put their capital into the family home and not into holiday homes in places like Whangamata. The negative impact on the total Whangamata property market would be direct and harsh.

a lighter note, once again we've had a fantastic Beach Hop thanks to Noddy and the wonderful team of volunteers who make it happen. This time of the year is fantastic for many reasons but one of the biggest reasons is because we have this fantastic event right here in Whangamata.

It was the first time we had ever had a police presence, which showed the heightened level of security monitoring around the





Our artists share their talents

Talk about pottery to some people and they're likely to ask: Who does pottery anymore?

Well, Whangamata woman **Holly Morgan** does - she creates mostly domestic ware but it's nothing like the boring old brown glazed mugs and cups of the 60s and 70s when pottery was alive and well.

Holly hopes to create a revival of the art by holding workshops and opening her working studio to the public in the near future.

But Holly's not the only potter to feature in the Arts Collective's Easter Weekend Arts Trail.

Veteran potter and Portage Ceramic Award winner **Maureen Allison** is also taking part with her work on display and for sale at her working studio (old woolshed) on the Whangamata-Waihi Rd.

Kieran Taylor, whose handworked 'Pipi Pouches' will be featured along with her paintings at Bernie Ross' arts hub in Moana Anu Anu Ave, are different again.

The three different forms of pottery will show viewers and visitors to the arts hubs and studios that the art has come a long way since the 60s and 70s!

And on a different note, weaving will be another form of art shown during the arts and studio trail by **Cherry Estcourt**.

She is passionate about all forms of weaving, and colour features strongly in all her pieces.

Experimenting with different forms of weaving, including traditional loom weaving and spindle weaving, Cherry's choice at the moment is the more freestyle form of Saori weaving.

LYNNE ROBINSON

Whangamata's Lynne Robinson grew up watching her printmaker mother working at her press, so it's no wonder Lynne herself has become a renowned artist of the same genre.

Art is so much in Lynne's blood she taught art and art history at Hamilton's Hillcrest High Schol for many years and later was employed by Waikato Museum working with young people in the youth gallery.

Then followed stints at a couple of Hamilton art galleries

'I used to take them through fun art history talks - not the boring stuff that puts them off,"

She has held well-attended 'art history with

a twist' talks at Whangamata's Little Gallery and is also a collector of major New Zealand artists' work - a peep inside the studio (which was the original bach) and the attached house stands witness to her and husband John's passion for art.

Not only are there paintings in all media but there is sculpture, ceramics and fabric art all hanging together in harmony.

Lynne has recently been changing direction and trying her hand at painting.

'Whangamata professional artist and mentor Kate Jones Madill has given me lots of encouragement. I'm finding that painting is a looser, less strict form of art,' Lynne says.



Lynne's artwork will be exhibited at Studio 423, Otahu Rd, at the Whangamata Arts Collective's Easter Studio Trail this month.












Help needed to bust the baddies!

Whangamata Harbour Care 1997 Inc is on a mission!

Protecting and maintaining harbour health is the target.

Since 1997, community members have maintained a constant battle against rodent pests and mangroves. But they need more help.

Membership of the group, which is free, needs a boost.

Joining is simple: email or phone the numbers below and we will include you in a monthly newsletter and advise of 'working bees'.

Participation is at your own level and speed.

'Our fight unfortunately is not only with pests, but also the Waikato Regional Council,' John says.

stalls over the next month in Port Rd.

'The community has, through rates, paid

millions to control mangroves, only 10 percent of this money has been used to remove the plant, the rest on meetings, reports and unending scientific studies.'

'An example of this WRC madness is the need for a new resource consent, for seedling removal costing \$40.000 or more to continue the same work carried out for 20 years'.

The Waikato Regional Council writes the consent, makes the conditions almost unworkable and then charges the community through rates, John says.

A glimmer of hope was the introduction of a TCDC and Hauraki District Council bill on mangrove control introduced to parliament by local MP Scott Simpson.

The select committee then presented a document so unworkable its outcome is now unlikely.

Wild Women

Last year's Wild Women participants came to Whangamata from as far as Dunedin and Napier as well as Auckland, Waikato and the Bay of Plenty

An interesting feature of the weekend was the number of mothers and daughters bonding through the various activities, says organiser Shaun Fay.

'Over all, the feedback was very positive. The combination of exercise, cuisine and dancing seemed to strike the right cord.'

The 93 women had the choice of attending yoga sessions, a walk through the Wentworth Valley, playing tennis, whacky golf or squash, and having social times.

'This year we have had terrific local interest and support and as a result increased the number of events, including a Wild Women's Party Night at Smoky Pallet and a sexologist, Shaun says.

'We hope to grow our numbers to 200-plus people. In its current format this may be the limit. Unlike other events in town which are 'open air', many venues do not have capacity for

more people.'

Spread over three days - May 17 to 19 - the weekend will conclude when the women attend the Ocean Sports Club's Breast Cancer Awareness High Tea.

Shaun says he's aiming to attract up to 300 women in 2020 and then seek further local support to grow the event further around the Coromandel.

'Remember, this is the home of Beach Hop - an event that attracts 110,000 people. It started with less than us the first year!

'We learned from last year that people are happy to buy on line, that the early support comes more from people out of town - they clearly have to plan more.

'We also learned we need to be more diligent on some of our briefings, especially for The Wentworth Falls walk. We forgot to mention that it wasn't a loop track which two ladies, who got half to Waihi, soon discovered.'

Women seem to really enjoy the time out with friends and its planned scheduling – the weekend after Mother's Day works well.

Join up! Join up! Firefighters wanted...

Lots is happening at the Whangamata w Brigade this year – apart from extensions to the building starting in a few months, the organisation is looking for new firefighters.

Regional trainer, Professional Firefighter Paul Tilsley, is based in Whangamata but trains the troops around the Coromandel.

He is looking for fit people of all ages (from 16 years and older) to join the brigade after several members have moved from the area or have, for personal or work reasons, become unable to help out anymore.

'We need new blood for various roles, from active people who want to be firefighters or support officers or admin

'To be a firefighter applicants must be prepared to undergo pre-entry tests, undergo a medical and police check, and be interviewed by our Chief Fire Officer, Nigel Airey.'

Paul says the first year is the toughest for a new firefighter as they undergo recruitment training and a first aid course.

But it's not all about firefighting – the brigade has about 120 callouts a year and that can involve car crashes, medical assists (when their help is required by the St John Ambulance teams), diesel or petrol washdowns, fundraising, appearing

in the Lions Christmas Parade and other PR exercises.

There's also participation at community events and, for the really keen, there's also the annual Sky Tower Challenge.

'The main thing for operational

firefighters is that we need commitment,' Paul says.

'Older members are there to help new recruits if they're at all uncertain about anything. We're a good team - and it's a good challenge for young mums with kids at school or people who are unemployed.'

Keen to join? Pop along to the Whangamata Fire Brigade on training night - Wednesdays at 6pm - or phone one of the contacts listed outside the fire station.

'I arrived here on the Friday, and on Sunday I heard that the store was for sale. I met the owners and by Sunday evening I had made an offer.

'Seven weeks later, I was living here and eight weeks later I owned the store. I had a good but busy job in Auckland as an office manager and PA for a pharmaceutical company and wasn't looking for another job or

'I loved Auckland but I fell in love with this quiet little hamlet,' says Bronwyn.

Since arriving, she and her daughters have been well received by the community.

'I'm surprised at how quickly the community has accepted us. They come down for a chat and we hold a coffee club on Thursday

'We are dog friendly - dogs are welcome to come in with their owners.

'We've kept the price of staple items - bread, milk and so on - at supermarket rates because there are a lot of elderly people here who can't afford to, or are unable to, drive into Whangamata,' says

Over the busy summer time she was helped out by daughter Chelsea, an Auckland University student. Another daughter Tabitha is store manager.

Colourful cushions umbrellas have been brought in to brighten the store- although the flowering hibiscus and other plants at the entrance already make the store a relaxing and welcoming place to visit.

Bronwyn has two other children who live 'very happily' in Auckland - Brittany and Clinton.

Whangamata Area School also showed their support with a vigil at the school during school assembly.



Run Walk Festival

Preparations for the 2019 GJ Gardner Whangamata Run Walk Festival are well under way by the organisers, the Whangamata Lions Club. Entries are now open and the organisers are keen to get a record turnout this year.

GENERAL TRAINING TIPS

- If you have never jogged or walked 5km or 10km before, please visit your doctor for advice before you start training.
- Don't over train: Always make sure you get plenty of rest in between training sessions and make sure you get at least one day's rest every week.
- Never train when ill or feverish: Don't try and train through illness, it will probably make it worse
- Be sensible about injuries: If an injury becomes worse when you try to train, then stop training.
- Be careful with stretching: Although stretching before a run is desirable, your muscles will not be warmed up and over-zealous stretching can do more harm than good. The rule should be to warm-up before you work-out by doing the intended activity very slowly with low intensity. Leave stretching for after your work-out, you are less likely to damage your muscles at this point because they have warmed up. Make sure you know the correct stretching techniques.



BEGINNER TRAINING GUIDE

- · Use the right shoes for your running style: A good specialist running shoe store can help here. Stirling Sports are able to offer a professional appraisal of you running shoe needs. If you overpronate, you may need shoes with extra medial arch support or you may simply need a shoe with good heel support. An appropriate pair of well-fitting shoes can make a big difference to your running. Don't expect your shoes to last forever. The cushioning of running shoes usually fails well before the sole wears out.
- Enjoy your training: This is most important. You are training for your enjoyment. Vary your running routes and don't push yourself too hard in your training all of the time. The Training Programme that follows should be used as a guide only.
- Keep your training individual: We all have different bodies and goals and our training programmes should be individual. You should not go out and do what others are doing.
- Missed workouts: If you have to miss a work-out, don't worry about it. Just go on with the rest of your training programme.





Water upgrade

The Whangamata water treatment plant is fourth on the list of Thames-Coromandel District Council's \$15.83m upgrading programme.

In all, 10 water treatment facilities across the Thames-Coromandel district will be upgraded to ensure the Coromandel's drinking water quality complies with the 2005 (2008) NZ Drinking Water standards.

The first to be upgraded is the Whitianga water treatment plant, where Masons Engineers has been building a new \$2.8 million water treatment facility on the current site.

This is a brand new plant with the latest technology and methodologies for treating water. This is on track for completion in May.

Tairua is the next town on the schedule, followed by Pauanui.

The upgrade schedule will then continue to the water treatment facilities at Whangamata, Coromandel Town, Matarangi, Hahei and Onemana.

Mayor Sandra Goudie said the council had budgeted \$15.83 million in the 2018-2028 Long Term Plan for the upgrade programme, which would take three years through to June 2021.

Five of the drinking water plants that treat riversupplied water (Coromandel Town, Thames, Tairua, Whitianga, Matarangi), will use membrane filtration technology, the highest-quality treatment available for this type of water source.

The other five drinking water plants will use filter/cartridge systems for treating bore-supplied water.

The drinking water treatment plant at Thames has already been upgraded and is not due for an upgrade as part of this project.

Whiritoa – 12km south of Whangamata. Swim or walk, collect

Whangamata Harbour, Ocean Beach and Otahu Estuary – check these areas for yourself. The various spots are ideal for SUP, kayaking, surfing, swimming, diving, spearfishing, snorkelling, jetskiing and skiing.

Onemana – swimming is OK along the beach. The south end is safest for children. A good beach for surfcasting. Mussels and kina in the area around the rocks.

Opoutere - All the above activities. Access through the pine forest. Bird watching is an added attraction here

Note: At all beaches, watch for rips and do not swim out beyond your comfort zone.



CYCLING

Just about anywhere is safe to ride in Whangamata as long as you respect the rights of other road users. The path from the Marina and along Moana Anu Anu estuary is ideal for walkers, runners and cyclists. Again, have respect for other users.



MOUNTAIN BIKING

Whangamata Ridges Park, five minutes north of Whangamata on SH 25 has numerous tracks from Grade 1 to Grade 6, offering exciting rides and spectacular views. The tracks are in a forestry area so please check accessibility before riding

Walking tracks at the end of Peninsula Rd offer spectacular ocean views and over Whangamata.

Wentworth Valley – a popular area with walkers and campers. Not accessible if fords are flooded.
About 1.5km heading south of town, turn right onto Wentworth Valley.
Many attractions on the valley walks, including waterfalls and swimming holes. Grab a brochure from info-Plus Visitor Centre in Port Rd.

Numerous adjuncts and clubs, from athletics to yoga, meet regularly in Whangamata so check with info-Plus if there's anything specific you're interested in.







MARCH 2019 CALLOUTS

Whangamata Coastguard had just one callout during March.

Over the past month Whangamata Fire Brigade attended eight calls including a petrol leak from a vehicle in Port Rd on March 7.

Two callouts on March 14 were to an alarm activation and, later that day, to smoke in a rural setting causing concern.

On March 20 the crew were involved with a medical assist, and on March 22 and 23, two separate serious medical events followed on March 26 by a fire at a rural address.

- 1. Quickly remove any contaminated clothing
- Avoid contact with any chemical and furthe injury to the patient.
- If the chemical is a powder brush it off, avoiding contact, before flushing with water.

2. Cool the injury

 Flood the burned area with copious amounts of water and continue for up to 20 minutes.

3. If a chemical solution has splashed into the eyes

· Hold the affected eyelids open to ensure water washes thoroughly under the lids to remove any trapped chemical. Call 111 for an ambulance urgently.

Bitumen burns

If a limb or finger is involved, keep flooding the area with cold water for up to 20 minutes.

If you can, crack the bitumen when it cools so it does not constrict the limb.

As a result, he and another friend were hit by the boat's propeller. Sadly, his friend died and the teenager Westpac 2 crew treated suffered multiple lacerations. 





How did we do it?

Opoutere Bird Saver started small as a bit of back yard hobby really, but then grew into something special that we have

I attended numerous talks and did a Controlled Substances Course and learnt about best industry practices. One thing I did pick up was that best industry practice is not always the best for all industries.

the concept of island trapping was born. We were lucky in Opoutere that our project was not restricted by a lack of funding. So we had the ability to try all methods as pests like stoats and rats are not the predators they are by accident, they are smart and highly intelligent animals killing machines - so to be able to catch them we had to also be smarter and not be scared to be

Island trapping is around the concept of an island, where everything is in one place - a DOC 200 trap, a bait staton and a good nature trap

What I had learnt is that the design of the DOC 200 wooden trap was an accident, meaning that rats and stoats are attracted to the box because of its design, not because of the lure being used - it caught many a rat with no lure at all.

Rats are inquisitive by nature but are very cautious as well which is a big downfall for the Good Nature traps. These are a fantastic Kiwi invention but by nature rats and possums are just not attracted to them.

They are lattracted to them

by the lure, so when food is in abundance why would a possum or rat want to point upwards towards the sky and walk up into a trap and kill itself - that, in my opinion, is not natural behaviour.

Yes, they work well as a mechanical function and do that job, but they fail in the first sense of attracting the animal. Our possums in New Zealand spend 90 per cent of their time mating or looking for a mate and 10 per cent eating or looking for food. In Australia where they come from it's the complete reverse.

Sadly this is where toxins like sodium fluoroacetate (1080), brodifacoum (active ingredient in your rat bait) and diphacinone

The pests are doing something that is natural to them - they

But these toxins are designed so the animals eating them don't get sick immediately, so they don't know that the toxin they are eating is killing them.

The problem with this method is it's not painless and it is a toxin, but sadly they are very effective in what they do and is why they must be used, especially in steep, dense and dangerous

But they do break down in the environment and in the case of 1080, simple old water breaks it down and it turns into vinegar all very quickly - what could be more perfect as a toxin. Luckily in NZ we don't have a shortage

Banded rail decapitated



Whangamata Harbour pest control volunteer John Dick (pictured) saw first hand the results of a stoat attack on a banded rail chick in its salt marsh habitat round the Whangamata Harbour.

The chick was decapitated in the attack and left, a random killing common to stoats.

The banded rail is a secretive marsh and farmland bird slightly smaller than a hen pheasant, its habitat reduced by the spread of mangroves in recent years.

Eight Whangamata Harbour Care pest control volunteers maintain a series of traps and bait stations reducing predators ... sadly one was missed.
