At 82 years, after a full and joyful life hard-won from the shadows of a childhood polio diagnosis, the last thing Jan expected was to face another life-altering battle.


But cancer, the silent intruder, doesn't ask for permission.

Rates Rebate Scheme now available to more SuperGold Cardholders

It's been a couple months since the Government released its Budget and we're now starting to see some of these policies coming into effect.

We know that many New Zealanders are struggling to keep up with rising rates, especially those on a fixed income. In response, the Government is making targeted changes to the Rates Rebate Scheme to provide greater support for SuperGold Cardholders.

From 1 July 2025, the income threshold increased to \$45,000, the maximum annual rebate rose to \$805, and full eligibility for anyone receiving only NZ Super, if their rates are over \$2,000.

That's good news for pensioners here in the Coromandel and across the country. The changes mean an estimated 66,000 additional seniors will be able to access financial relief that wasn't available to them previously

This additional support is one of the ways the Government is delivering targeted relief to those who need it. We've also brought inflation down by cutting wasteful spending, and we've increased superannuation which gives couples an extra \$129.40 every fortnight, thanks in part to the tax relief that came into effect last year.

If you think you might be eligible for the Rates Rebate Scheme, I encourage you to apply – even if you haven't qualified before. Dear Editor,

The announcement that the Hetherington Road stormwater upgrade will proceed on July 21st brings into sharp focus a pattern of confrontation that has plagued our community's infrastructure discussions for several years. It's time to acknowledge that our current approach isn't working and take decisive steps to break this destructive cycle.

For too long, discussions about Whangamatā's stormwater needs have been characterised by mistrust, limited transparency, and adversarial positioning between Thames Coromandel District Council (TCDC) and community groups. This ongoing conflict serves no one's interests and prevents us from achieving the collaborative solutions our community desperately needs.

The current Hetherington Road project, while addressing urgent stormwater issues, has proceeded without the comprehensive evaluation and community engagement that such significant infrastructure decisions warrant. The Port Road alternative, adopted in the 2019 Master Plan, remains unexplored in any meaningful public forum. Meanwhile, requests for



project evaluation documentation have been declined, creating an information vacuum that fuels community concern.

We cannot continue to operate in this manner. Years of confrontation have created entrenched positions that obscure our shared objective: effective, sustainable stormwater management that serves Whangamatā's long-term interests. The current impasse benefits no one and delays progress on infrastructure that our growing community urgently requires.

It's time for a reset. The Whangamata Stormwater Action Group extends an olive branch to TCDC and proposes a fundamentally different approach to resolving our stormwater challenges. We call for facilitated dialogue under independent chairmanship, designed to move beyond historical grievances toward constructive problem-solving.

This process would work within TCDC's existing constraints while addressing legitimate community concerns. The objective isn't to relitigate past decisions but to establish a framework for future collaboration that ensures all affected community groups have meaningful input into decisions that impact their daily lives.

We propose developing a clear action plan that:

- · Establishes transparent criteria for evaluating infrastructure options
- Creates genuine opportunities for community input
- Builds trust through open information sharing
- Focuses on securing long-term solutions rather than short-term

The stakes are too high for continued conflict. Our community's infrastructure needs won't disappear, and neither will the requirement for public confidence in how these projects are selected and implemented. We must find a way to work together effectively.

The current contractor commitment could easily be redirected to any approved solution, making this an ideal time to pause and engage in the collaborative process our community deserves. This isn't about stopping progress - it's about ensuring that progress serves everyone's interests.

Whangamatā's future depends on our ability to move beyond confrontation toward cooperation. The Stormwater Action Group stands ready to engage constructively with TCDC and all community stakeholders to forge a path forward that serves our collective interests.

The cycle of confrontation must end. Let's choose collaboration instead.

Campaign Series: "Who's really making the decisions?"

A community-led spotlight on council process, planning failures, and the need for a true Spatial Plan for Whangamatā. The Whangamata Ratepayers Association are bringing a series of articles over the next few weeks to support the need for better planning for Whangamatā.

This week, we discuss the Hetherington Road pipe upgrade project. This project is part of a wider stormwater plan – but some key questions remain as to why it was prioritised over other key areas? ARTICLE 1: Pipes, Pavement, and Poor Planning - What's About to Happen on Hetherington Road?

Big Dig, Big Questions

In the coming weeks, one of Whangamatā's busiest roads—
Hetherington Road—will be torn up for a major stormwater upgrade. It's a \$3.1 million project that will bring noise, road closures, and months of disruption right through the heart of our town.

But many locals are asking: Why here? Why now? And who actually made the call?

Another Surprise Project

This is one of the most expensive infrastructure projects Whangamatā has seen in years. Yet there's been no open public consultation, no clear explanation of the benefits, and little information shared with

affected residents or businesses.

According to expert reports from 2019, this project wasn't even supposed to be next on the list. That spot was meant for Port Road—a more cost-effective, less disruptive, and ultimately more logical upgrade location.

So why was Port Road quietly dropped?

Port Road: A Missed Opportunity?

Engineering reports had previously identified Port Road as a better choice for stormwater upgrades. It's shorter, easier to work on, and less likely to interfere with traffic or town events. It also had the potential to help with actual flood relief in nearby areas—something the Hetherington project can't claim.

Despite these advantages, Port Road was shelved without explanation—and the more complex, costly Hetherington upgrade was pushed through instead.

Are We Getting Value for Money?

Ratepayers are footing the bill for this \$3.1 million project. But what are we really getting in return?

Local experts have pointed out that:

 The upgrade won't reduce flooding for the 1,900+ properties recently labelled at-risk.

- The proposed pipe changes don't address the real causes of runoff or surface flooding.
- The benefits to the wider community—or to existing homes in flood-prone areas—are still unclear.

Worse still, developers who add pressure to the stormwater system with new builds aren't required to contribute to these upgrades. Ratepayers are being asked to carry the cost alone.

Community Concerns: Planning in the Dark

Many in the community are growing frustrated by the pattern: big projects with big budgets—but no clear process, no community voice, and no strategic vision.

Residents want answers:

- Why was Port Road ignored?
- What flood risks are actually being addressed?
- Where is the long-promised Master Plan for Whangamatā?

The Hetherington Road project seems to be just the latest example of decisions made behind closed doors—leaving locals to deal with the cost, disruption, and confusion.

What We Really Need: A Spatial Plan

This is bigger than pipes. It's about how decisions are made for our town, who gets heard, and whether the planning is being done for short-term fixes—or long-term benefit.

Whangamatā urgently needs a clear, community-informed Spatial Plan—a roadmap that sets infrastructure priorities based on real data, fair funding, and genuine public input.

Without it, we risk spending millions on patchwork projects that solve little, and benefit even fewer. Whangamata Ratepayers will be finding out what is important to residents and ratepayers in an upcoming petition. Make sure you have your say.

Support needed to sustain vital work with local teens

For over 18 years, the Whangamatā Youth Trust has provided life-changing support for teenagers in the Whangamatā community, helping them reach their potential and navigate challenges through mentorship, support, and meaningful activities. The important work they do is now under threat, with a significant drop in funding placing their programmes and hours at risk.

The Trust operates out of the Youth Room and Whare Mahi at 301 Port Road, thanks to the ongoing support of the Whangamatā Baptist Church. From this base, they offer a wide range of support to young people, including one-on-one mentoring, group sessions and programs, working closely with Whangamatā Area School.

The Trust employs three dedicated, part-time staff members: Manager Ryan Thompson, and Community Youth Workers Simone Hughes and Nicholas Tautuhi. Together, they support and empower young people from all walks of life, those navigating challenges as well as those seeking connection, purpose, and opportunities to grow.

Regular activities run by the Trust include youth group nights, whakairo (carving) classes, driver licensing support, an employment pathway for school leavers, an after-school drop in, school holiday activities, camps, and outdoor



adventures. These programmes are not just fun, they offer structure, connection, and hope for many who need it most.

"Young people here are dealing with overwhelming challenges," says Tautuhi. "We work with students facing bullying, isolation, family violence and mental health struggles. Some feel completely disconnected or believe they have no future. Our goal is to walk alongside them and remind them they're not alone."

National statistics from the NZ Health Survey show that the percentage of young people reporting mild or greater anxiety or depression has risen from 32.5% to 52.5%. And the number experiencing moderate or higher levels of anxiety or depression has nearly doubled from 14.4% to 28.7%. This means over a quarter of young people face significant mental health challenges.

Demand for services has grown dramatically, but at the same time the Trust has experienced a significant drop in donations post covid. With increased competition for grants and ongoing economic pressures, the organisation has been operating at a financial loss just to keep up with need.

Now, the Trust is facing difficult decisions. Without new funding or community support, they will be forced to reduce their programmes and hours, cutting off lifelines for the young people who need them

most.

The Trust is urging local businesses, residents, and supporters to get involved, whether through financial donations, resources, or partnership opportunities. Whangamatā Youth Trust is a registered charity and all donations are tax deductible.

Deadly snake washes up on Whangamata beach

Residents and holiday makers have been urged to stay away from Whangamatā Beach after a deadly yellow-bellied sea snake washed up alive on the sand last weekend, the same day another was seen at Little Bay in the Coromandel.

The Department of Conservation

(DoC) said it had a report of a yellow-bellied sea snake washing up on the beach in Whangamatā.

"Although they are generally docile, these snakes are highly venomous, so it's important not to approach or handle them." The Thames-Coromandel District Council

described it as an "important message" for those in the region.

According to DOC, about six to 10 yellow-bellied sea snakes are sighted each year, mostly around the northeast coast of the North Island, though they have been discovered as far south as Cook Strait.

"Beached yellow-bellied sea snakes will almost certainly be dead or dying, as they are entirely pelagic (they cannot live on land). They breed in the tropics and spend a large amount of their lives drifting on the ocean currents.

"They can dive up to 50m for three to four hours, depending on the temperature of the water, and feed on small fishes," the department's website said.

"Although they are generally docile, these snakes are highly venomous,



so it's important not to approach or handle them."

DOC advises that if you see a

- Stay well away even if it looks docile, it may still be active.
- Keep children and dogs at a safe distance.

Community support needed after TCDC declines funding

The Whangamatā Community Swimming Pool is urgently appealing to the people of Whangamatā and beyond for support after the Thames-**Coromandel District Council** (TCDC) declined its request for additional operational funding for the 2025/2026 year.

The Pool Committee sought \$139,000 in additional funding the minimum amount required to maintain the pool's current year-round operating hours and meet Poolsafe accreditation standards. This figure includes no allowance for unplanned repairs or maintenance, leaving the facility extremely vulnerable to future disruptions.

The pool has been hit by several unforeseen rises in operational costs since the last funding assessment from TCDC in 2022. The cost of power has increased by over 20%, and due to recent tightening of safety regulations for public pools, staffing levels during opening hours have had to increase.

All of this has occurred without any additional operational funding from TCDC. With no additional operational funding forthcoming from TCDC, the committee has been left with no alternative but to reduce opening hours.

Effective immediately, the pool will operate Monday to Friday from 6am



to 10am and 2pm to 5pm. Reduced operational hours of 7am-10am Saturday and 11am-2pm Sunday will be reliant on public sponsorship.

The committee is determined to retain year-round opening and to do everything possible to ensure the pool's survival, but with local body elections on the horizon, they are seeking community support. "This pool is not a luxury. It is essential infrastructure for Whangamatā," said Chairperson Rob Boston.

"We will continue to fight for its

future, but the Council must step up - and we need the community behind us now more than ever."

"Last year the Council owned pool in Thames received \$740,130.00 in rate payer funding. Our request for the remainder of the year is only 30% of that, and even going forward, we assess our total operational requirement to be around \$400K per annum, a very reasonable request in comparison."

Opoutere Beach wreck leaves WRC to clean up mess









The sailing vessel grounded on Sunday, 15 June, and it is unclear what caused it.

Waikato Regional Council has not been successful in making contact with the owner and incident investigations remain with

WRC Maritime Officers collected and disposed of three loads of debris, focusing on the collection of plastics, foam, fiberglass, chilly bins, and fuel containers. Debris mostly consisting of wood but also fiberglass, a yellow aluminium tank and vessel hull sections remain scattered along a 200m section of the rocky shore.

Wreck salvage contractors completed an on-water assessment outlining the costs and complexity of uplifting the wreck from the rocky shoreline.

Waikato Regional Council's Maritime Services proposes that the wreck is not a risk to navigation and the remaining wreck debris clean up are the responsibility of the vessel's owner.



Just seven chicks survived breeding season

This is the first in a series of articles giving insights into the lives of some of the interesting and iconic birds commonly seen in and around our local harbours and beaches. Each species habitat requirements, their seasonal movements, factors threatening their continued presence here in Whangamatā and their current conservation status will be covered. Birds featured will include N7 dotterel banded dotterel, banded rail, oystercatchers, pied stilt, bar-tailed godwit, bittern, fernbird, royal spoonbill and various gulls, terns, shags and herons.

Hopefully the series will result in a better understanding of each species and the threats they face locally. Birds are a constant presence and visual component in all our lives, whether they be in our gardens, or on our roads, rivers, beaches, lakes, bush areas, coastal seas, etc.

The first species to be covered in this series is the northern N7 dotterel. This bird was teetering on the edge of extinction up until their plight was recognised in the late 1980's and conservation action initiated. At that time their population was restricted to beaches in Northland, Auckland, Waikato and the Bay of Plenty. They numbered around 800 birds and were rapidly declining. By 2011, due to the introduction of predator controls and nest protection measures, they had increased to around 2500. They have now recolonised former beach habitats as far south as the Wairarapa on the East Coast, including a number of off-shore islands and Taranaki in the West. Their Conservation Status as determined by the Department of Conservation is At Risk - Relict, a vulnerable endemic species.

The Whangamatā population of breeding birds currently numbers around 18 pairs. During the winter months large groups of dotterel totalling around 115 birds, gather

at various Whangamatā harbour, estuarine and beach sites. Many of these come here from neighbouring beaches. They flock together for mutual protection, to feed, rest and recover from their breeding season exertions. It is also the time when they moult and grow new feathers, and for some it is the time to socialise and establish new partnerships.

Their nest is a simple shallow scraped bowl on open sandy foredune sites, usually above the reach of high-tide wave surges and on the seaward side of the more densely vegetated higher dunes. These small, trusting and endearing birds are very protective of their nests. They will establish territories around them which they defend whenever they are approached by other birds, people, dogs and any native or introduced predators. They do this by first trying to attract the intruders away by putting on broken wing displays or charging at them and aggressively making loud distress calls.

The dotterels main native predators are harrier hawks, black-backed and red-billed gulls, and their introduced predators include cats, dogs, stoats, ferrets, weasels, hedgehogs, and rats. Adult dotterels, their chicks and eggs are all targeted by most of these predators

Sadly, in the past 3 breeding seasons, the numbers of pairs successfully raising chicks through to fledging (flying) age at Whangamatā Beach has declined significantly, despite the best conservation efforts of our 'volunteer minders'. Nest monitoring over the past 2 years has revealed only 13 eggs hatched successfully from 35 laid in the 2023/24 breeding season, with only 4 chicks surviving to flying stage. This last breeding season only 13 chicks hatched from the 51 eggs laid, and just 7 survived to the flying stage. It seems nest desertions due to human and dog disturbances are the main cause for most of these egg and chick losses.

We currently have a small group of volunteers in Whangamatā and another in the Onemana/Opoutere areas who have taken on the responsibility of looking after their beach populations of NZ dotterels. Their activities include locating, signposting and fencing-off nesting sites, predator controls, and when necessary moving nests out of reach of rogue waves during extreme high-tide storm events.

What can you do to assist the continued presence of these birds on our beaches:

1. When exercising your dogs on the beach during the breeding season,

keep them under close control, at all times and on leads whenever in the vicinity of nesting or roosting dotterels.

- 2. Try to avoid walking your dogs along the beach during high tide periods and keep away, as far as possible, from the base of the foredunes.
- 3. Familiarise yourselves with the current local dog by-laws, respect and follow them.

If you observe other people breaking them, report their actions as soon as possible to the local TCDC dog ranger and the DoC.

- 4. When you and your children are walking, playing or just laying around sunbathing at the beach, do so at least 15-20m away from known nest sites, whether or not they have been fenced off. Avoid the temptation to seek a closer look at the nest as this inevitably results in the incubating bird being disturbed off the nest.
- 5. During non-breeding periods each year, from March through to August, large groups of dotterels and other shore and sea birds gather together on our harbour, estuaries and beaches to rest and recover from their feeding efforts. They generally crowd closely together during high tide periods and any disturbance of them should be avoided if at all possible
- 6. For those people living close to beaches and the harbour perimeters, reduce the opportunity for your pet cats and dogs to roam freely from your properties. Numbers of nests, eggs and chicks are destroyed each year from such occurrences.
- 7. Add your voices to those seeking increased dog control by-laws and law enforcement on our beaches and the provision of alternative dedicated dog exercise areas.

Training continues monthly with several new members joining the group which includes management, field and wander search roles. This now brings the membership to 38 volunteers.

One of the aims for the group this financial year is to acquire a permanent base to store our equipment which consists of a vehicle and trailer.

The AGM concluded with the presentation of service certificates to three of the members consisting of two 5 year certificates to Ross Stewart and Zoe Batten and one 21 year certificate to Lammina Hutchison.











Stormwater upgrade set to begin on Hetherington Road

Work is about to begin on a major stormwater upgrade along Hetherington Road in Whangamatā, as part of our Council's commitment to long-term resilience and infrastructure improvement.

To mark the start of this significant project, our Council and our contractors, Schick Civil Construction, were joined by local Mana Whenua for an opening karakia and site blessing at dawn on Wednesday 9 July. Following the ceremony, the group gathered back at the office for introductions, a korero on the cultural history of the area and a project briefing from the team.

The Hetherington Road stormwater reticulation upgrade is part of our six-year programme to improve performance of the stormwater network and mitigate flooding.

Construction work is scheduled to begin on Monday 21 July and expected to be completed by the end of October 2025. This may involve significant traffic disruption and people may want to plan their travel accordingly during this period. See details below.

The project involves a full upgrade of the existing stormwater pipeline, running from the Moana Anu Anu Estuary outlet near the causeway through to Port Road. This work will mitigate surface water flooding in the area. The stormwater pipeline has been designed with climate change and sea-level rise in mind. Wa-stops (which prevent seawater from entering the pipe during events such as king tides, while still allowing stormwater to discharge into the marina) will be installed. As part of our on-going efforts to improve stormwater quality, gross pollutant traps (GPTs) will also be installed to capture debris and other pollutants before discharge.

Upgrading the entire network will help enable a series of subsequent capital works upgrades in areas with significant stormwater flood issues, (Casement Road, Tuck Road and Port Road/town center).

This was identified as a priority in the Stormwater Improvement Project Master Plan, which guided how the \$2.135 million capital budget for 2024/25 would be allocated.

"This upgrade is an important step toward protecting the Whangamatā community and their property from increasingly severe weather events," says our Water Services Manager Brett Houston. "We're committed to completing these essential works efficiently, respectfully and in close partnership with iwi and the local community."

Temporary traffic management will be in place on Hetherington Road while this work is underway. Construction will take place Monday to Friday, between 7:00am and 6:00pm, with stop-go traffic control and some detours or no-entry zones in place at times. Please plan ahead, allow extra time for travel and follow all on-site traffic management directions. Thank you for your patience as we carry out this important work.

New library weaves together people and place

Te Ara Mātauranga, Waihī Beach's new library, service centre and community hub, opened today - a space interwoven with community, creativity and connection.

Around 160 people gathered to mark the opening of the new \$5m facility whose name, gifted by Te Whānau a Tauwhao hapū, means 'The Pathway to Knowledge'.

A blessing was performed by Reon Tuanau, of Ōtāwhiwhi Marae. together with tamariki from the neighbouring Waihī Beach Kura, with Western Bay Mayor James Denyer cutting the ribbon to declare the building officially open.

"Libraries today are important community hubs - their role is so much more than just a repository for books. They're public spaces where communities come together to learn, connect and thrive," says Mayor James Denyer.

"This has been a collaborative process with involvement from elected members, Council staff, mana whenua, the school, and the community centre committee. I want to thank all those involved for achieving such a great result, and in particular our builder. Hawkins. for delivering ahead of time and on budget.'



Valeta Duncan, Council's Customer Services Manager, celebrated the community-led approach behind the new library.

"This project has been as much about the process, the relationships, and the learning as it has about the building," says Valeta.

"From the start, we knew building a new library was a big deal, so it had to be an inclusive process. Everyone had the chance to have a say especially our tamariki, who were encouraged to dream about what a new, shiny library could look like for

"Our partnership with Te Whānau

ā Tauwhao Ki Ōtāwhiwhi has been crucial. We wouldn't have this beautiful building that honours the stories and rich cultural heritage of mana whenua, without it."

As well as the name, Te Whānau a Tauwhao gifted design elements connecting the building to Ōtāwhiwhi marae, the taiao (environment), and the coastal nature of Waihī Beach, including a kōwhaiwhai depicting the mangopare (hammerhead shark). Representing resilience and perseverance, the mangopare is depicted in the steps leading into the library, and windows throughout the building.

Reading 'cubbies' inside the library are named after different types of obsidian found on Tuhua (Mayor Island) - Tuhua, Paretao and Kahurangi - also gifted by Te Whānau a Tauwhao.

A large harakeke weaving, by Kairāranga (weaver) Marino Magee, is on display as you enter the building, reinforcing the importance of taiao.

The new 400sqm library and service centre is four times bigger than the old library and is open 43 hours a week, compared to the previous 23 hours, bringing it in line with Council's three other library and service centres, in Te Puke, Ōmokoroa and Katikati.

The space includes two large meeting rooms with a moveable wall, one smaller meeting room, public computers and free wifi, dedicated reading spaces, 'bring your own device' work spaces, and a table for activities such as crafts and nuzzles





Julia hopes the seat brings peace to others, too. "It may have Ezra's name, but it's for anyone missing someone. A place to sit, remember, and feel connected." The bench rests near the rocket Ezra once loved, with the rainbow in sight — a gentle place to imagine him soaring beyond, to his place in the sky — overlooking laughter, play, and the kind of joy Ezra brought into the world.

Waihi's postal service reflects the town's growth

In the 1880s, the first Post Office operated from a small general store beside the Waihi Hotel (now known as the Commercial Hotel). The store was managed by Daniel Campbell, who also ran Waihi's first mail coach service. He delivered letters and parcels by horse-drawn carriage between Waihi, Paeroa, and Tauranga.

As the gold industry developed, so did the town. By the 1920s, the Post Office had become a busy centre. Telegrams were sent to and from mining companies, newspapers, and stockbrokers. A team of message



boys, telegraph operators, and postal workers kept mail moving despite slow roads and limited technology. Waihi's population was about 5,000 at the time, and the Post Office was a key service in everyday life.

Today, Waihi's postal service continues to adapt — now embracing digital tools to meet modern needs.

The Waihi Paper Plus and Toyworld store, a long-standing NZ Post retail agency, was recently selected as one of only a few locations nationwide to pilot a new digital customs form for sending overseas. Store owners Stephan and Petra say they're proud to support the initiative locally.

"We were really excited to be chosen," says Stephan. "NZ Post even sent a film crew to record the new process in action in our shop, which will be used to help train other stores across the country."

The update replaces traditional paper forms with a streamlined online system. Customers scan a QR code in-store using their smartphone or device, complete the required customs information online. and receive a barcode. Staff can then scan this to instantly access the details and process the parcel.

This shift reduces the chance of errors or delays and enables NZ Post to more easily reflect changes in customs requirements across different countries.

Understanding that not everyone is confident with technology, Stephan and Petra have made sure help is available at their store. "We know it's new for some people, so we're happy to guide customers through the process," Stephan says. "And

we've chosen to provide a device instore for anyone who doesn't have one"

From handwritten telegrams to digital declarations, Waihi's postal service continues to evolve - and thanks to NZ Post, locals can now send their parcels overseas with greater ease and accuracy.

The closure is necessitated by the need to ensure the safety of the public for the duration of exploration operations on the land.


During the closure it is an offence for a person who is not authorised by the Director-General to remain on, or enter, the area indicated on the below plan.






