Greenwashing

In recent days we have had the Government celebrating with great fanfare, the announcement of a \$140 million subsidy to enable NZ Steel to transition a furnace and kilns from coal fired to electricity. This initiative follows the subsidising of the expansion of the EV fleet (the clean car upgrade) and investing in the electrification of some rail networks. This exercise in political window-dressing includes no mention of how this extra electricity demand is to be managed.

Inevitably the increase in demand

for base-load power will require further reliance on the Huntly coal fired power station and its consumption of enormous tonnages of imported Indonesian coal. Shifting the reliance on coal from one site to another will achieve very little and the variable supply from wind or solar will not come close to satisfying demand.

Additionally, we now have Transpower advising they may not be able to guarantee supply at times of peak demand over the coming winter. Further, we have the Energy Minister giving condescending advice to consumers on how to save electricity in the home.

Another Budget blowout

Last month the Government released its Budget, which we were led to believe would finally show some financial restraint. However, a raft of new spending initiatives has left everyday New Zealander to pick up the tab for another set of misguided policies. Their big spend up will put more inflationary pressure on the economy. This will put even more strain on Kiwi's with mortgages and make it harder to balance the weekly budget.

It was the perfect time to help hardworking Kiwis by adjusting the income tax thresholds. This would have been a meaningful change which could have gone someway to addressing the ongoing cost-ofliving crisis. Unfortunately, we got more evidence that Labour believes that they know how to better spend your taxpayer dollars than you do.

The Budget did include a package aimed at supporting local councils to improve the resilience of local roads. This is good news for the Coromandel because many of our roads, such as The 309 and the Tapu-Coroglen, are fragile and in desperate need of attention. When these routes are closed, more pressure is put on other routes around the Peninsula. Now it's up to TCDC to put our case forward to get our fair share of funding.

Meanwhile we are still waiting for the urgent action needed to get SH25a reopened. A reliable roading network is key for the Coromandel and I'll be doing everything I can to support these efforts.

Banking Hub Whangamata – trial set for July

Whangamatā News sought some clarity from the NZBA on the new Regional Banking Hub. It will provide face-to-face banking, cash services, and internet and phone banking, and is set to open in Whangamatā in July.

The regional banking hubs are an initiative led by the New Zealand Banking Association - Te Rangapū Pēke and New Zealand's six biggest banks - ASB, ANZ, BNZ, Kiwibank, TSB and Westpac

The hubs are a trial to test community and customer demand for multi-bank services in towns that are not big enough for several bank branches.

There are currently four banking hubs – in Martinborough, Ōpunake, Twizel and Stoke. Last year the banks decided to launch a second phase of the trial.

Three new hubs are opening over the next three months, in Whangamatā, Ōpōtiki and Waimate. This phase of the trial will last for one year. The six banks won't close regional branches during this time in



order to find a model that works for customers and the community.

The Whangamatā Banking Hub will be in Shop B, 608 Port Rd, Whangamatā. It is a relatively central location, providing access for businesses and personal customers.

NZBA CEO Roger Beaumont said the hub will provide a range of services.

"We're excited about bringing a banking hub to Whangamatā which takes on lessons from the first round of the hubs trial.

"The new hub will be located in a stand-alone location and have a multi-bank smart ATM and a coin and note change service. A concierge will be available to assist customers to access the services,

which include an ATM, tablet for online banking, and phone. These services will be available in private areas to help ensure confidentiality.

"We're also introducing a daily banker service, where a banker from each participating bank will be available for meetings four hours a dav. one dav a week.

"I know the last few months have been difficult for Whangamatā and I'm sure the hub will be welcomed. I hope it is successful."

The Smart ATM and change machines will be in a secure lobby that can be accessed 24 hours a day. The concierge and daily banker services will be available from 10am - 2pm each day.



Andre was born in Matamata, a little brother to Frank and Matthew and third son for John and Janet Hilliar. Being the baby of the family, he was an adored little brother and before long was able to keep up with his older siblings. Most things in life became a competition even to the



point of who could eat their dinner the fastest to be first in for seconds, the grapefruit toss, cart races down the driveway to name but a few. Animals and birds in particular have always featured in Andre's life, and most will remember Maggie either with fondness or terror.

Schooling through Firth Primary, Matamata Intermediate and Matamata College. The only thing Andre liked about intermediate, was the days he had woodwork and would tell his Mum he would be late home helping the teacher clean up so he could get a chance to use the lathe.

Matamata College, his favourite subjects were Maths, thanks to the tutelage of Mr Wilson, Tech drawing and woodwork.

He left College to take up an apprenticeship with Mr Peter Galvin, and when Peter moved to Mount Maunganui Andre followed. He spent a few years there furthering his skills and making the most of the lifestyle the Mount had to offer, sun, surf, ocean and the mountain. Back then they used to hold a downhill race from the top of the Mount, which he loved competing in and would often just go up and down on the old school 90's bikes as of an evening.

He then moved back to Matamata



and did a short stint at NZCDC Waharoa as a Process Tester, under his brother Matt's charge, then to Trower Panels installing panels with them.

Then the old Black Bach called, and

he never looked back. Whangamatā became his forever home. It wasn't long before he was building out on his own and a ride around the town will show off many of his builds.

community, volunteers and how they help us work together and learning to be responsible in our own families to do our part and look after ourselves".



Whangamata Ratepayers' public meeting this Sunday

Since the public meeting on Sunday, 9 April, the Stormwater Working Group has attended two meetings with TCDC officials with a third planned for Thursday, 15 June. In preparation for that meeting a second report has been completed. See the Whangamata Ratepayers Association website: www.whangamataratepayers.org.nz

A public meeting has been scheduled for King's Birthday Weekend on Sunday, 4 June, in the War Memorial Hall at 2.00pm.

Coromandel MP Scott Simpson will attend to hear first-hand the concerns of residents and ratepayers.

WRA Working Group findings are quite clear: successive council administrations have failed despite numerous commissioned reports to maintain current infrastructure and plan for growth.

A fundamental role of local government is managing, maintaining, future proofing the infrastructure assets paid for by the local community over decades.

Local government needs to change: there must be transparency, financial accountability, a robust commitment to listening and responding to community concerns and requirements.

When scanning Coromandel newspapers there is regular correspondence reporting instances where justifiable local community concerns are ignored and overridden by council.

Which brings us to Local Government Reform, and the submission from TCDC to the

review into the Future of Local Government draft report key points?

- Revitalizing citizen led democracy.
- Allocating roles and functions in a way that enhances wellbeing.
- Local Government as champion and activator of wellbeing.
- A stronger relationship between central and local government.
- Replenishing and building on representative democracy
- Building an equitable, sustainable funding and finance system.
- Designing the local government system to enable the change we need.
- System stewardships and support

Whangamata Ratepayers Association believes strongly that there must be greater independence given to local communities. Community Boards must be allowed to actively represent all ratepayers for the benefit and wellbeing of the town.

However, despite the proposed Local Government reforms, we learn that Government is seeking to introduce New Regional Planning Legislation (replacing RMA with co-governance).

A recent excerpt from the Taxpayers' Union, advises these reforms will cut to the very heart of why we have elected councils. It means that instead of democratically elected decision makers, local planners will be replaced with regional co-governed "central planning committees" to decide what can be built and where.

Under this proposed law, powers over planning and when a resource consent is required will be stripped from local councils and handed to 15 new co-governed "Regional Planning Committees". That means decisions about consent for your deck, new home, factory, your farms water take, and decisions made for your city or town will be made by people you have not elected and cannot be voted out.

This unelected body will be known as the 'National Māori Entity'.

At any time, iwi or hapū can produce a Te Oranga o te Taiao (environmental well-being) statement, dictating how the Minister of Environment must uphold the 'intrinsic relationship' between iwi/hapū and the environment in National Planning Frameworks for which there is no appeal process outlined in the bill.

Taxpayers' Union Campaigns Manager, Callum Purves, said:

"New Zealanders are rightly frustrated with the cumbersome Resource Management Act, which restricts how we use our land and has fueled a serious infrastructure and housing shortage, but this proposed replacement will make the situation much worse.

"Not content with seizing water assets from local communities, the Government is now proposing to grab planning powers from local councils and transfer them to fifteen unaccountable, undemocratic, so-called Regional Planning Committees.

At this rate there won't be much left

for our council to do.

"These changes will significantly reduce local control over decisions affecting communities while introducing many new and undefined concepts that will likely lead to legal challenges through the courts.

This increased red tape and bureaucracy will simply lead to higher building costs for everyone."

These are serious concerns that the future of local government is in jeopardy: 3 Waters is a good example, local assets managed by a committee in a central location.

The TCDC 2023/24 Annual Plan submission process has produced an annual rate increase of 11.6%.We have yet to learn the full detail, due to be announced 27 June 2023. To accommodate change Council also develops a Long Term Plan every three years, the current plan is for 2021 – 31 and the next LTP will be adopted in 2024. TCDC will begin the consultative process for the 2024 LTP later this year.

Now is the time to act, we as ratepayers and residents must drive this process.What are our priorities and vision for our town?

Come to the meeting on Sunday, 4 June and have your say.

These cover all wars right through from the New Zealand Land Wars and the Boer War, to the First and Second World Wars and the later Korea and Vietnam conflicts. New Zealand Servicemen and Women first served overseas in the Boer War in South Africa around 1900 and the war medals awarded for this service are needed by the buyers, as are any other Medals from early New Zealand and the New Zealand Wars.

General service medals from both the First and Second World Wars will also be purchased, but as can be imagined these were awarded in fairly large numbers. "If a group of medals has any special award for bravery such as the Military Medal, Military or Flying Cross or other medals for Distinguished Conduct or Meritorious Service, these can add great value to a group" stated Mr Tony Grant, buyer for John Bertrand (Collectables) Ltd. "Many families have old medals, some dating back to early Imperial days, that they are not sure what to do with. These are better off in the hands of collectors who will look after them. Community Patrol wants help to keep baddies at bay

Keeping the baddies at bay is something a group of local volunteers take pride in doing from Opoutere in the porth to Whirit



the north to Whiritoa in the south.

These are the people behind the Whangamata Community Patrol who are looking for new patrollers to grow the team.

More volunteers are needed so that greater frequency can be achieved with more patrols being undertaken.

Across the country and locally, including Paeroa, Thames, Whitianga, Cooks Beach and Whangamatā, community patrollers work in association with police on crime prevention. There are community patrols groups throughout New Zealand, being the additional eyes and ears for the New Zealand Police.

Whangamatā members would love to have their vehicle out on a daily or nightly basis, to achieve this they are urging people to come and join this incredible community service.

Current patrollers come from many different walks of life, some retired, some working – but all with the same intention of helping to protect both people and property within our community.

Members are only asked to patrol once each month. Appropriate training is provided so that all patrollers have the necessary skills to handle any emergency or crime related encounter they may experience. Safety of the patrollers is paramount.

A monthly patrollers hour-long meeting is held to ensure appropriate updates and information is passed on.

Whangamata Patrol Chairperson, Kay Gregan, said members had achieved many successes over the years from finding stolen vehicles and assisting people in distress to assisting police during new year disturbances.

She says that during patrols, the patrollers kept an eye on the commercial areas of town, community buildings and facilities, along with both permanent residences and holiday homes – ensuring they are secure and safe. However, they are not a security team.

"During our patrols we have constant contact with police which means support or assistance is only a radio call away."

"We are always keen to hear from new people who may wish to join and support the patrol, if interested please contact me on 027 337 6222 or Geoff Tempest 027 489 2368.

For anyone interested it can be arranged for them to join an evening patrol and get a feel for the role undertaken by the community patrollers. All patrollers are Police vetted.

Cumulative daily rainfall compared



And wonderful to have one of the founding members of the Club, Wendy Dowling, a mainstay to the club and whom has given so much to the ongoing success, a selfless person, who everyone wants to be friends with, where all the ladies can go to for quilting advice and presented with a well deserved bouquet.

It all started in 1992, when evening patchwork lessons were held at the Whangamata Area School, tutored by Shelley Robb.

Then, in February 1993, a formal group was established with Norma Ewart as founder and President. The 'first ever group' consisted of Norma Ewart, Catherine Anderson, Ann Asplin, Gay Barnes, Thelma Beckett, Diane Collins, Eileen Dickson, Wendy Dowling, Anne Gibbons, Jeanette Head, Lyn Johnston, Phillipa Lelievre, Betty Marriot, Pat Reid and Delwyn Stack - the original 15 founding members.

Initially, meetings were held in various homes, until numbers grew too big. Some of the venues were the "then" Game Fishing Club at the end of Beach Road, the Williamsons Golf course Clubrooms, and the Area School Sewing room.

By 1997, the club was hosting both day and evening meetings, to allow for those working and that year they saw in October, their first ever exhibition (at the Cedarwood Motel Conference Centre). By 2019 the Whangamata Patch and Quilt hosted its first 12th Biennial Exhibition. 2021 was the first exhibition ever to be cancelled due to Covid, so the club has shifted its biennial exhibition to Mataariki Weekend.

Dr Brian Coffey


Dr Brian Coffey (Coff) was born in Raetihi but from early childhood lived in Putāruru. His interest in the natural world throughout his school years there made study of the subject an obvious choice at Auckland University.

Having completed a BSc and realising that a career in science demanded higher qualifications, he embarked on a Masters degree in Botany, graduating with honours.

Newly married to Susan, he then began a doctorate in Botany; his research topic being aquatic plants, both native and introduced.

Following his graduation, Brian was appointed to the position of Engineering Scientist at NZED (ECNZ today) based in Hamilton, working on the problems caused by introduced aquatic plants in hydro lakes throughout the country. His love of SCUBA diving and vast experience in the sport proved to be a real asset in the role. Underwater photography too was essential to his work.

Two years later Brian moved to the Ruakura Research Station to head their Aquatic Plants division and



continue efforts to understand and control the spread of introduced plants (lake weeds) so disruptive to industry and freshwater recreational activities. The call of the sea prompted the family to buy a property in Whangamatā in 1981, followed by the decision to leave the Public Service and establish their own Environmental Consultancy.

Requirements of the newly created RMA ensured a diverse range of work, both in freshwater and marine environs, while a highlight of Brian's professional career at that time was to lead the dive team in Greenpeace's driftnet campaign. Driftnets in the Pacific were abolished as a result of this fight to rescue whales and dolphins from nets in the open sea.

Brian was made a Life Member of WWF acknowledging his contribution to their Scientific Advisory Team.

He was both a part time lecturer and Student Project Supervisor at the Ecoquest Foundation in Kaiaua and part time Director of Research at the Pacific Coast Applied Research Centre in Tauranga, roles which endorsed his belief in the importance of encouraging young people to study and care for the environment. As a 3-star CMAS Scuba diving instructor, he introduced countless students to the underwater world and was author of a comprehensive training manual.

In 2000, the couple relocated their home and business to Whangamatā. Their love of the town made his involvement with Harbourcare an easy decision, joining the battle against the encroachment of mangroves in our waterways among their other projects.

As a local who cared deeply about our beach and coastline, the fragile dunes, harbour and estuary, Brian welcomed the opportunity to volunteer his knowledge and experience to support such a dedicated organisation in their efforts to gain necessary resource consents.

A true warrior for the environment and devoted family man, Brian is survived by his wife Susan (their marriage spanning 53 years) three children and seven grandchildren.



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


