New Zealanders are being encouraged to brush up on recycling etiquette as national standardised rules for kerbside recycling come into force today.

Kerbside standardisation is expected to divert an extra 53,000 tonnes of recycling, about half of the recyclable materials thrown in rubbish bins each year and divert an extra 83,000 tonnes of food waste, the Government says.

From February, all district and city councils will accept only glass bottles and jars, cans, paper and cardboard (including pizza boxes), and plastics numbered 1, 2 and 5 in their recycling collections.

Plastics 1, 2 and 5 include milk, soft drink and juice bottles, large yoghurt containers, 2L hard ice cream containers, cream cheese, sour cream and cottage cheese containers, some dip containers, and some tomato, BBQ, and

mustard squeeze bottles. It also includes meat trays and some takeaway containers.

New items excluded from kerbside recycling are items less than 50mm, aerosol cans, liquid paperboard (commonly known as Tetra Pak), plastics 3, 4, 6 and 7, aluminium foil and trays, all lids and items over 4 litres.

Plastics 3, 4, 6 and 7 include small yoghurt/sour cream pottles, styrofoam, PVC pipes, polystyrene, biscuit and cracker trays, pill packets, some dip containers, soft plastics (plastics you can scrunch in your hand such as biscuit and cracker bags and trays, packaging from bread, rice, packaged vegetables and fruit, shiny gift wrap) and some tomato sauce, mustard and BBQ squeeze bottles.

Whangamata and the Coromandel continue to shine

It wasn't quite a long weekend, but it was easy to see that lots of people turned it into one and made the most of Waitangi Day to spend some time here on the Coromandel.

There's never a bad time to visit our region, but the Peninsula is simply stunning at the moment and it's been great to see a steady stream of visitors enjoying all we have to offer. No doubt they're drawn to Whangamatā to experience what readers of the New Zealand Herald named our country's Best Surf Beach in 2024. The extra icing on the cake is the boost visitors gives our local economy. Businesspeople I've talked to have been thrilled we've had the type of summer peak season they haven't seen for the last three years.

For me though, last week meant I was back in Wellington as Parliament kicked of the political year and I'm pleased to report our new government got straight back to business. We're determined to

get New Zealand back on track. There's a lot of legislation to pass through the House, but one of the core policies of the coalition Government is to get inflation under control. Rising prices have caused a cost-of-living crisis that has affected households up and down the country. We simply can't continue to have the rampant inflation that we've experienced over recent years.

We are aware of the negative impact that inflation has on the value of people's incomes and savings. In our first 100 days in office, we've committed ourselves to restoring the Reserve Bank's single focus on price stability, reducing the regulatory burden on businesses, and reining in government spending. The latest inflation data shows that the rate has declined to 4.7%, but we won't be satisfied until it falls below 3%.

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Support needed for more renewable energy

George Williams is quite right when he says we must follow the science, and the science is quite clear that renewable energy is far better for the environment than the continued use of fossil fuels.

Renewable sourced electricity is very high in New Zealand, at about 80%. Wind and geothermal generation has increased from 7% to 23% of the country's total electricity generation in the last two decades, but there is still a shortfall and coal is imported to cover this. About a third of this coal is used at the Glenbrook Steel Mill, and at Golden Bay Cement in Whangarei.

The rest is burned at Huntly Power Station to produce electricity. Genesis Energy which runs Huntly Station has said it will stop using coal 'under normal hydrological conditions' by 2025, with the intention to phase out coal completely by 2030. The company is in negotiation with a number of renewable projects, such as the large wind farm in Taranaki that generates enough clean electricity for 65,000 homes a year.

Hopefully, George will support these projects and reduce our reliance on fossil fuels. Last year was the hottest it's been since records began, leading to extreme weather events and disasters world-wide

The real folly is ignoring the fact that man made climate change is a massive threat to us all.



Utilise fish heads & frames

Did you know, on average, often only about 35% of the fish is consumed as skinned and boned fillets?! Like what we are conditioned to expect from almost all Supermarket offerings. The remaining 65% of the fish, i.e. the heads, frames and offal are often discarded.

Currently, this prized rangatira kai is entering various waste streams or is dumped. It is clear our natural resources are not being treated with enough respect. So Legasea, along with the New Zealand Sports Fishing Council, The Outboard Boating Club of Auckland and the Papatūānuku Kōkiri Marae has teamed up to develop The Kai Ika Project.

This Project utilises fish heads, frames and offal which were previously going to waste. Since September 2016, previously discarded fish parts have been collected and redistributed to families and community groups in South Auckland who value these fish parts and enjoy their sweet flesh.





The fish heads, frames and offal which were previously going to waste, now the Kai Ika team distribute these heads and frames to an appreciative local community. The offal is used as fertiliser in the marae gardens where kumara is also grown for distribution.

Since first established, over 385,000kg of previously discarded fish parts have been collected from various sources and redistributed to needy families and community groups all over Auckland.

As part of the New Zealand Sports Fishing Council, the Whangamata Ocean Sports Club supports this amazing initiative, and we invited the Kai Ika filleting trailer to our recent Nauti Girls fishing competition. Unfortunately, due to the weather there was no fish to fillet this time!

Meeting at Onemana just before sunrise, there was a buzz of excitement as the sun rose over the horizon

With perfect sea conditions, swimmers and kayakers entered the surf on Onemana beach to rendezvous with a flotilla of support boats and jet skis before heading south for Whangamatā.

This was not a race, but an event that allowed swimmers of varying abilities to take part and enjoy the ocean environment whilst at the same time offering a mental and physical challenge.

Three groups quickly established themselves as the faster swimmers Jo Matheson, Brent Gilbert-De Rios and Mark Chamberlain leading the way, the second group, lan Gunthorp, Claire Richardson, Bronwyn Bermester, Mark Hayes, Dave Kirby, and Ele Pinfold maintained a good pace, with Roisin Howley, Chris Loughlin and Rob Boston following in their wake.

The support crews consisting of Greg Bermester, Chris Lloyd, Suzie Chamberlain, Paul Pollard, Bindy Ground, Neil Richardson, Graeme Gunthorp and Hunter Matheson provided excellent support throughout the course.

Opoutere School: Term 1



It was great to see the sun shining over summer and an influx of holiday numbers adding to the local economy. With the height of summer behind us we now look to the year ahead and the likelihood of a warm late summer.

Öpoutere School staff welcomed all tamariki back on 7 February and are all excited for 2024. We are delighted to have retained our strong staff from last year and together, had a positive Teacher Only Day planning the term and year ahead. Our day culminated in some team bonding with a hikoi to a significant local area, the 'Luck at Last Mine' Taungatara.

We wish to acknowledge our youngest 5-year-old enrolments and their whānau. Starting school for the first time is always a special moment and we look forward to you being part of our Ōpoutere School whānau. On top of this, we have other new enrolments across the kura and we look forward to supporting you all with your transition. Nau mai haere mai, whānau! During Term 1 we invite all whānau to a whānaungatanga hui, an opportunity to connect informally with kaiako while visiting classrooms and socialising with other whānau and school staff.

We start the year with a focus on our first core belief Mana (self belief, identity and pride) and the Adventure Learning focus on Te Moana. Senior classes are planning surfing, paddle boarding and kayaking days and Junior classes are learning the skills of Waka Ama and celebrate with paddles in the Whangamatā Harbour.

We are really excited and grateful to again have swimming lessons provided by the Whangamata Real Estate Community Pool. Monique and Jana will provide 8 lessons over three weeks for our Year 0-4 tamariki. As well as this, all classes will have the opportunity daily to enjoy the school pool developing water confidence, learning to swim and of course, having lots of water fun including perfecting their manu!

Junior kaiako will be attending another Pūrākau Storvtelling day to be able to share local Pūrākau with tamariki and enhance their cultural knowledge and understanding. Term 1 sees Life Education and Keeping Ourselves Safe programmes delivered schoolwide as part of our Health curriculum

Furthermore, we have our usual sporting opportunities at both school and regional level throughout the year. The annual **Öpoutere School Adventure Race** (Te Whakataetae) takes place in Term 3 and Expedition (Te Haerenga) at the end of the year. We have cultural opportunities such as Kapa Haka for both Senior tamariki (Tane Mahuta) and Junior tamariki (Puawai), Matariki Week, and we are excited to announce that we are planning and preparing for a whole school production in Term 3. Our environmental kaupapa is weaved across our school curriculum and our juniors continue with their



Whangamata Ratepayers Association AGM will take place on Saturday 24 February, at 11am in the Baptist Church, Port Road, Whangamatā.

Mayor Len Salt has confirmed his attendance to our AGM.

The AGM will include a report upon the association's activities throughout the year, these include:

- Promoting WRA, included rebranding, regular articles in local media, regular newsletters, posted on WRA Facebook and website, increased membership.
- Representation in a wide range of community organisations
- Hosting public meetings Stormwater/Flooding, meet the candidates
- Working with Coromandel ratepayer groups to form an Alliance of residents and ratepayers' associations across the region.
- Attending and presenting at numerous Community Board forums, including networking meetings.
- Making submissions to Annual and Long-Term Plans, including several



environmental submissions to Waikato Regional Council.

- Established a working relationship with our Community Board, Councillors and Mayor.
- WRA committee member representatives are on several of the working stakeholder groups, including the Stormwater/ Flooding Stakeholder group.
- Consulted with residents and ratepayers by way of a survey that received 561 responses, these provided a clear message to Council as to the wishes of the community.

Three main points:

- Stormwater and Flooding issues resolved;
- Regular maintenance and servicing of infrastructure of assets paid for by ratepayers;
- 3. Rates paid by the Whangamata ratepayers are used for the benefit of the town and its environs.

There are many issues facing residents and ratepayers, this year has the potential to be a tumultuous year.

 Whangamata Stormwater/ Flooding Stakeholder group has been meeting regularly for over 12 months, we are yet to see a clear plan that will begin to address this issue

- The 2024/2034 Long Term Plan will be unveiled shortly with public feedback taking place in March/ April, with hearings end April, early May.
- The past 12 months have been challenging for Local Government, the damage caused by Cyclone Gabrielle and ensuing recovery has come at a cost, with significant rate rises on the horizon.
- Increasingly people question whether local government in its present form is working for us.

Being a member of the WRA management committee requires empathy, commitment, effort and determination, a key role is that of advocacy, listening to the concerns of ratepayers and bringing them to the attention of Council.

Our management committee would welcome new committee members, who are willing and able to contribute and make a difference at this grassroots level of local government.

AGMs provide an opportunity to reflect on the past year and what is ahead, we look forward to welcoming you to the WRA AGM on Saturday, 24 February.
