# Banking Hub explained

Whangamatā News, like many other business owners, attended the Enterprise Whangamata **Business after 5 at Smoky Pallet** last Thursday, to hear from Roger Beaumont, Chief Executive NZ Banking Association on the workings of the new banking hub opening in the arcade later this month.

Roger told us what the Hub will be and will not be. Offering "the context and rationale about doing these regional banking hubs. They came from a lot of industry discussion with customers, banks and government."

"A lot of small communities, and Whangamatā is a classic example of this, clearly it wasn't sustainable to have four or five banks in town.

The way that we have been banking and how we bank now has changed in the last 10 years, we do a lot more on line, digitally, but still have a need for physical and practical interaction for all of us."

They were looking for a hybrid, to allow ongoing face to face interaction to continue but in a sustainable way for all the banks involved.

Four pilots in Stoke, Twizel, Martinborough and Opunake were launched, with the six largest banks represented being TSB, ANZ, ASB,



Kiwibank, Westpac and BNZ.

The four locations all differed and they learnt a lot about tweaking and integrated all those positives into our hub, opening here in late July.

They soon realised that customers needed privacy in a hub without being overheard of a confidential conversation of their needs.

What are the basic services the hub offers?

It will not be a traditional branch, its a concierge service, where some one who does not work for any of the particular banks, will come in

and direct you and your query.

The core of the hub will be a Smart ATM. It will deposit and withdraw coins and notes, as long as you belong to one of the six banks represented.

There will also be a change machine, so if you are a retailer, and have float challenges, its easy to change the mix with notes and coins as you require.

There will also be private phone booths, so you can talk to your bank on a priority 0800 number, more so than your own home phone or cell, there will also be iPads to work

into your own banks webpage with concierge assistance.

This is the important note:

There will be a 'dedicated banker' on different days of the week. In Whangamatā, the following bank representatives will only be available from 10am to 2pm as they'll be travelling from out of town.

Kiwibank Monday: Tuesday: **ASB** Wednesday: BNZ Thursday: Westpac Friday: ANZ

TSB have video capability only at this stage.

They cater for complex things such as business loans and mortgages.

We may need to be a little more organised and structured for the appointments for our time.

Small business is the life blood of small town New Zealand, in a community like this, sticking together and having services like this will integrate in a very practical

The message is simple: if we want to maintain the Hub, we need to use it! Of course, the facility is open to our neighbouring folk of Tairua, Pauanui and beyond.







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# Students expanding world view

Whangamata Area School is seeking home stays for the stream of International students arriving early 2024.

Whangamatā News caught up with Acting Principal Don Stewart and Pam Balt (a local Mum, who is currently hosting a 16-year-old German International student Anneke Maier).

The exchange student scheme is up and running again since Covid-19.

Don Stewart told us "It's beneficial for the school to have international students, from a financial point of view, but, more importantly it's beneficial for our students to meet people from overseas, to expand their world view".

Currently WAS school has five

students from Thailand, Japan and Germany. "Next year the school will have an influx of German students from the start of the year, different agencies vet the students, to ensure they are academically capable, they come out here to have an experience of New Zealand life, the beautiful landscape and the friendly community we offer", says Don.

Pam tells us "the popularity of Whangamatā is astounding, many students end up going to Hamilton, Auckland, Waiheke Island, Mount Maunganui and Thames."

"Students tend to choose Whangamatā for a reason, a lot are from the city, they want to be in a small town, the surf programme is very popular with them."

The revenue from International students assists the school with extras needed to purchase, like upgrading playgrounds, and the Toku Ara programme is a great

Don said "When covid hit, it was the end of the money there for a while, we realised how important it was. The school has 250 secondary students, we don't really want too many International students, otherwise they tend to form small cliques and speak in their own languages."

The message is strong from Principal Stewart, 10 students is the max as full time, although some

come for 6 months or 9, and then another will do the same, not all take the full year.

"We want them to knit with others, to have a really good time, but also have our students benefit from it."

There is a process involved for host families, to have a Police check, a home visit and interviews, just treat them as part of the family, embrace them. The most important thing is to think "If my child were going

over to Germany, what would I want them to experience?".

There is a weekly payment to cover everything for the student in your home, insurances also cover the student.

Pam told us " it's not a cost to the host family, it covers everything - It's an experience".

She also told us that Anneke will be heading home soon, to her Summer and her family, we asked Anneke for her comments.

"My time here in New Zealand was a really exciting part of my life. I experienced more than I ever expected, a lot of amazing things and a few rough things like lots of moving because our house flooded. Although my time here is coming to an end, it has been the best time of my life with all my new friends and my house whanau who have truly become a part of my family. I will never forget this experience, and it breaks my heart to say goodbye soon. I plan to come back to visit my New Zealand family once I finish my studies."



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## Environmental and infrastructure

Local and holiday homeowners are feeling increasingly powerless about flooding every time it starts to rain again.

It is not only residential owners affected by flooding but recently Port Road business owners bravely battled torrential rain in a determined attempt to prevent rising water entering their businesses in the middle of the night.

Lisa Grove and husband Jake, armed with brooms, were furiously sweeping water towards stormwater drains, only to find they were full of debris. Lisa said she could see the water rising over the pavement like a small river finding its way toward the entrance doorway of her new business. This adds a new layer of stress which is not welcome.

Other business owners angrily reported this was not new, their Port Road business had been hit many times. Despite installing more cess pits and raising buildings to protect their premises, because stormwater from neighbouring properties discharge directly onto the road into gutters that are partially clogged with debris and drains that do not work.

Over the past two weekends Whangamata has experienced several significant rain events, relatively short, but with heavy volumes. After one such deluge the Whangamata Area School rugby field (Achilles Ave end) was under water for much of the weekend. This is becoming more frequent.

What is certain is we can expect more of the same in the coming winter months. It's very clear that the ongoing stress is taking its toll both emotionally and physically on business operators.

### **FLOODING**

• E Tours

On Thursday 15 June, representatives of the Stormwater and Flooding Working Group met with council infrastructure officials.



Port Road 2.00am 18 June.

Regretfully there is not a great deal to report. The Working Group are disappointed that there has not been a series of practical outcomes on such items as:

- The identification and monitoring of the water table, this information was to have been made available to the community. -
- Maintenance of assets, where cleaning of sumps and cess pits has taken place, there have been significant improvements, however this has been sporadic and only after a "request for service". A planned maintenance schedule is yet to be sighted.
- No immediate solution to the situation of the Williamson Park Pond and weir, the beach is undergoing serious scouring, similarly at the outlets by Hinemoa Street and Otahu estuary.
- FENZ (Fire Service) reported that Hydrants are silting up and need to be cleaned before use.

Our community deserves better from council, in terms of proactive service. It should not be the exclusive task of Community Board members, Councillors, ratepayers and residents to report flooding, blocked drains, identify damaged, poorly maintained amenities, etc.

Quite clearly Council's "Request for Service" system is not working effectively.

Where are Council employees and contractors in this process?

During the engagement process with TCDC the Working Group

has discovered many stormwater reports commissioned by previous council administrations dating back to Cyclone Bola in 1996 which prompted council into action and commission a report, "but Council advised that no response was necessary because Bola was a 1 in 250 year event and we won't have stormwater problems for 10 more generations".

In 2003 Cyclone Zoe comes along, more flooding, so council springs into action and commissions more reports. Locals were told "it's just another 1 in 250 year event, so don't waste money on stormwater because that's the last we'll see of Cyclones for 10 generations".

In 2017 Cyclone Cook caused significant flooding. Another report was commissioned, which resulted in

Kiwi Road one of 25 streets singled out for stormwater improvements from a 2005 Opus report. The Opus report recommended Kiwi Road have a 375mm diameter stormwater pipe, curb and channel and overland flow paths dug into the Williamson Golf Course. In 2021 Kiwi Road got curb and channel, but without stormwater pipes and no overland flow paths.



# solutions sought

As a result, residents are worse off, after an estimated cost of over \$1 million, for no significant improvement.

Several requests for an explanation over the poor design and cost overruns were made to previous council administrations, none were forthcoming

Back to the present, 2023, after two back-to-back Cyclones. Gabrielle and Hale, and the likelihood of more of the same over the winter months, where to from here?

We await findings of two more reports currently in progress.

The question we ask: "Why has only one of the previous recommendations been considered or implemented from previous reports?"

### **WATER TABLE**

We discovered Opus Consulting had been engaged to report on the water table between 2008 and 2012 to monitor the water table level in relation to rainfall. This is essential information for soak pit owners.

One of the big problems Hale and Gabrielle presented was that the extreme rainfall caused the water table level to rise and breach the ground in many of the lower lying properties causing flooding and

Whilst the water table drops naturally over time it isn't at the moment because of the continual

We have also found reports advising Council soak pits and cesspits must be regularly cleaned out. The actual stormwater monitoring plan requires them to be pumped out annually in May each year, this has not happened.

Our engineers suggest that the road soak pits may now be silted up, ruined, and never function properly again.

Meanwhile engineers have

confirmed that lowering the water table by pumping can affect/lower the water table to properties 300 meters away. This is good news for most of Whangamatā that rely on soak pits as lowering the water table will mean these can start working again which will reduce surface ponding.

The downside of this argument is it works against us because Williamson Park Pond, being kept full of water, affects properties 300 meters away by reverse/lifting the water table above the sea water level up to the pond level, nearly 2m

We are of the firm belief lowering of the water table in the pond will have an immediate effect by lowering the water tables at least to properties within 300 meters of it. This means the Williamson Golf Course would start draining, along with neighbouring properties from there down to the pond.

Council seems unwilling to urgently address the Williamson Storage Pond

The entire pond is counterproductive for the beach, Williamson Park golf course and

neighbouring properties.

An environmental and infrastructure solution must be found, one that ticks all the boxes, does not permit contaminated stormwater to flow into the ocean, scouring the beach, and relieves the backpressure on the stormwater pipe work to allow properties to drain and the water table reduce. This is complicated as Waikato Regional Council (WRC) does not certify wet detention ponds, or manmade structures designed to permanently hold and retain stormwater collected off roads. Pumping stormwater directly into the ocean is illegal, and ruins our beaches, reserves and

waterways. Stormwater from roads is dirty and contaminated so must be managed with sediment control and filters before it discharges - not into the ocean, but to estuaries.

The Working Group needs your help. We need photographs taken whilst the Williamson Pond was being emptied. If you have any useful information, please share this with

We need stormwater assets built fit for purpose, maintained, and serviced by the council with a scheduled management plan, not just when a drain is overflowing.

The Working Group encourages you to take your concerns directly to the Community Board members, talk to your Councillors, contact Whangamata Ratepayers Association (WRA) photos and other relevant information can be sent to whangaratepayers@gmail.

Check the WRA website, open the link called WRA Library and open the 2005 Opus report. In that report you will find a list of recommendations, street by street with costings. Non have been implemented until 2021.

We challenge TCDC officials to answer, through local media, these questions and issues raised.
