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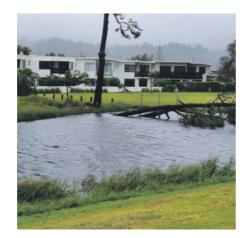
#### Lower the weir

Isn't it time the Community was listened to?! Many meetings have been held at the pond in Williamson Park but things remain the same.

For six years, while on the Community Board, I have tried to get both Councils to listen to what we have been saying. That is "lower the weir", as anyone knows that your inlet pipes (bringing the water in) has to be higher than the outlet pipes/weir (taking the water out).

Why, then, are we being told that the weir works perfectly when the inlet pipes are lower than the outlet onto the beach? This holds the water and stops it from flowing out as it should do. Despite all these meetings at the pond after each flooding event nothing gets done and homes and property, in proximity, keep getting flooded.

The weir, over its 20 something years, has been built up with rubbish and silt, to the point where it doesn't work properly, as it did when first built. It is now at least 20 metres in length from the beach and the gabions are all broken and rocks



dispersed under all the sand, etc. Lack of any constant maintenance over the years has allowed this build

If Williamson pond and weir worked properly then the flooding around the adjacent streets would not be so severe as the pond would not overflow and hold onto the water.

Come on Council: get this sorted before the next lot of rain.

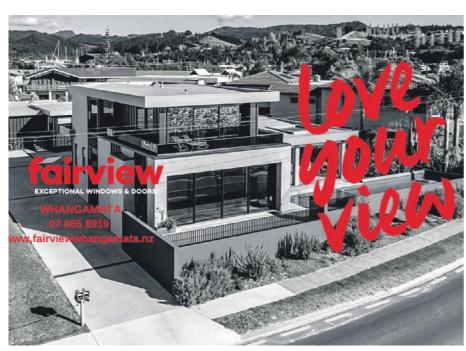
Thames Coast Road will open allowing access to the west and northern part of the eastern seaboard.

## Ratepayers urged to attend meeting



The Whangamata Ratepayer Association (WRA) AGM will take place on Saturday, 25 February in the War Memorial Hall at 11am.

2023 was always going to be momentous year for Local Government, dealing with the legislation of 3 Waters, proposed Local Government reform, with inflation running at close to 8%, there will be pressure to increase local rates.

Whangamata Ratepayer Association is collaborating with 17 district Coromandel Ratepayer Associations on the proposed Local Government Reforms and the likely effect on each of the regions when water operations are removed from Council control to 3 Waters control.

NB: latest information in the current Water Services Legislation Bill, that is now in front of a Select Committee (submissions close 12 February), which shows that the risks and liabilities of the huge debts expected to be taken on by the four Water Services Entities, will not be passed onto the Crown - as expected - but will be forced onto ratepayers!

If receivers are called in over a Water Entity defaulting on its debt obligations, under Clause 137A, ratepayers would be liable: "A charge under this section must be assessed as a uniform charge in the dollar on the rateable value of property in the service area".

Coromandel Ratepayer Associations are hopeful of a meeting with the full council before Local Government Reform submissions close on the 28 February to allow Councillors to hear first-hand the concerns of the district ratepayer associations.

As a result of the recent storms, our council faces many additional

challenges and issues in the coming months. The cost of repairs to infrastructure and services and the rising costs of delivering those services

Our town has suffered heavy flooding, power cuts, infrastructure failures and the collapse of a section of the Kopu Road which will have ongoing ramifications in the months to come.

All of us will be affected in some way. Already there are concerns for those who require regular medical treatment in Thames. Our reliance on the Whangamatā - Waihi Road is going to be put to the test as the volume of traffic increases, especially heavy vehicles.

Here at local level our councillors, community board and businesses continue to grapple with major issues availability of affordable housing to attract skilled people to work in key service industries. Infrastructure, with emphasis on stormwater, roading, as well as environmental issues: maintaining the quality of the harbour, estuary, beaches and surrounding countryside.

All of these come with a cost, at a time of high inflation, rising cost of living, and following the recent weather events, the cost of repairs to infrastructure and services.

There is much to do, we urge residents and ratepayers to attend our AGM. TCDC Mayor Len Salt and hopefully CEO Aileen Lawrie have agreed to attend our AGM Saturday, 25 February, 11am at the War Memorial Hall.

Now is the time to engage!

## Perimenopause sent me into burnout... literally

Lin Alchin, from Whangamatā, shares her perimenopausal experience with us, in the hope to help other women going through this stage of life.

It was April 2021, I was 46, and that was when I first noticed changes to my body. Small things to begin with such as large volumes of hair loss, brain fog and difficulty focusing on

In 2022, I met with a blood nutritionist and she confirmed I was in perimenopause. I began supplementation and felt better, however, by October, the symptoms ramped up and overnight I was crippled by anxiety and low mood. I struggled to focus at work and there were some days I couldn't bring myself to turn the laptop on as I was paralysed by overwhelming thoughts. Crying was something that happened daily and for no reason, it was a confusing time as I was happy with my life, so it just didn't make sense.

The following weeks were horribly debilitating, I would wake in the night with panic attacks, heart pounding, tingling electric feelings in both my arms and legs and would lie with my hands on my chest to calm the breathing.

Then arrived the exhaustion. I was sleeping anywhere from 1 to three hours a day and that's after having a good 8-10 hour sleep the night before. Then the opposite happened, I had a week where I would wake in the night and not go back to sleep for hours!

My motivation was at 0% and all I managed was the bare basics; cooking a meal and doing the washing. That's it!

My self-belief and confidence hit an all-time low, I rang my husband in tears and said I can't do my client session tonight. I couldn't face

I thought I was going crazy. I thought I would never be able to

My job as a life coach means I am very self-aware, and yet none of the tools or skills to navigate life's challenges worked and there was not one thing that would help shift the low mood. It was at this point, I knew there was something more going on.

I booked a doctor's appointment and went in armed with my knowledge and said I believed these were perimenopause symptoms (I had 15 of them) which had now led me to burnout. She said it was possible and signed me off work for two weeks.

A week later I spiralled further, the panic attacks were severe and at times I felt like I was having a heart attack. If I had to go out I would hide beneath a cap, I couldn't bare seeing anyone. I walked most days, however I couldn't even walk to the beach without having a panic attack or crying. The low point was when I called my husband to pick me up from the beach as I couldn't walk home.

I booked a second doctor's appointment and she told me I was depressed, gave me antidepressants and signed me off another four weeks. I was told I was too young for HRT. I am now 48!

I felt completely defeated. Whilst I had a very low mood, it was not the same feeling as being depressed (I have been in the black hole before. and this was totally different). I took one pill, cried and went home.

My husband said "you're not depressed". I said "I know!". He then went on a hunt to find a perimenopause specialist in New Zealand, to see what else we could do. In the meantime I upped my supplementation, started St John's Wort and Meno-me.

Unfortunately, these didn't work. The anxiety was so bad that I was now biting my fingers and when I looked down I saw blood dripping. This was not me.

Two weeks later I had a phone appointment with a perimenopause specialist in Wellington. Within a few minutes of sharing what had been going on, she confirmed I was definitely perimenopausal and that antidepressants would not fix the problem, that the low mood was hormonal and that I was a suitable candidate for HRT (Hormone Replacement Therapy). I picked the script up an hour later and get this: within 24 hours all of the symptoms stopped! I had my life back. Even my husband said "Lin's back!".

I wanted to share my experience to end the stigma and raise awareness for others, not just women, but men and work places.

Research tells us that all women will go through perimenopause, 75% of women will experience symptoms and of those 25% will experience severe symptoms.

Interestingly the most common symptom talked about are hot flushes - which I have only had twice! Here are my symptoms, (however I believe there are over 80 different symptoms):

- Exhaustion and sleeping a lot
- Anxiety
- Panic attacks
- Insomnia
- · Loss of joy
- No motivation • Inability to focus on work/tasks
- Low mood
- · Lacking in energy
- Isolating myself
- Feeling of isolation and loneliness
- Changes to vision (reading glasses required)
- Dry eyes
- Struggle to concentrate & drive
- Memory loss/brain fog
- Extreme fatigue
- Two hot flushes!

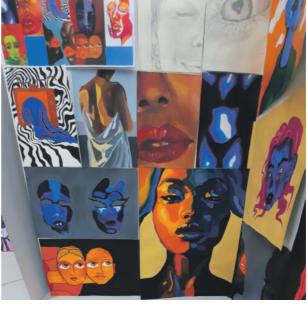

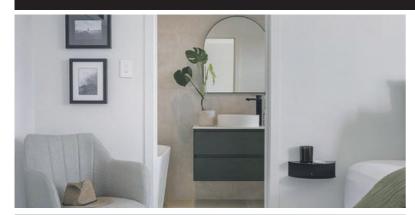

## Roofs need to run off into storm water systems

Jimmy Corlett chaired the second 'pond meeting' on Waitangi Monday morning at Williamson Park. Aimed to get council there and let everyone chat about the pond crisis, he thanked contractors who got onto the job so quickly.

Whangamatā News asked Jimmy prior to the meeting about some fairly robust Facebook posts he put up and has gathered a large following in agreement with those opinions.

Corlett told us "My initial posts were out of frustration from a reply I received from TCDC regarding an email sent to them (actually the senior engineer), about my concerns that the Pond and Weir at Williamson Park were not working as designed.

"They disagreed. I then consulted and researched it, and went online with my concerns not only with Facebook, but with ex-work colleagues and consultants, who also agreed with my concerns.

"TCDC Community Board, District Councillors and Council staff were given many opportunities to respond. They didn't apart from a condescending news release stating they were trialling draining the pond.

"The pond is meant to be drained and de-silted frequently, at least every two years. The last time was six years ago. "

Corlett also stated "There are other issues about ongoing groundwater that I have studied, soakhole designs that are not taking into account climate change etc. I'm not an expert, but have 50 years of experience in civil construction. I have been a full time lobbyist for Civil Contractors NZ Inc. for 15 years until retirement two years ago.

"It's actually quite simple really. Water is hydraulic and flows downhill. Impediments don't help and not responding to consultants' reports are telling."



Whangamatā News attended the second meeting where Terry Walker, Deputy Mayor and all Community Board members were present and were welcomed. Terry's opening statement was: "Who here has connected their roof water to the stormwater system on Williamson Road?" only one raised a hand...

"So there's the problem, all the water that comes out of the large pipes into the pond is only surface water from the road or any house that's connected to the road. That's the idea of stormwater systems as in any city, to collect all the rain water off the roofs, you take it away and dispose it, so it's not causing localised flooding. Therefore, any issues at your place with ponding is coming from ground water, and this occurs first in the lower areas of

"We are currently looking for council to upgrade the storm water system, getting more connected roofs to where stormwater pipes are best placed to improve our stormwater network that removes water from

Walker also explained "The only ground water connection here which was installed around 2018 was to the Williamson golf course, this included a sump and drain to the Williamson Road stormwater system. With only 400mm fall from the clubhouse to the sump, it's a very slow flowing drain - off of water. Recently trenches were dug, to try and move water off the golf course and back through the stormwater pipes to the pond. The discoloured water seen is

mostly from the new drains on the golf course. The golf course is a big soakage sink, a lot of water lands on it and that's the lowest part of town, and the first area that the town's water table is going to pond.

If you live around those parts you need to be more resilient around weather events, call the fire brigade, if you need sand bagging or get yourself a small pumping system to shift water onto the road. The streets around Kiwi, Tui, and Moa Roads are of concern".

Walker assured the crowd "The pond will be dug out, it should have been dug out every five years if not sooner, but it doesn't really affect the hydraulics of this, it's a gravity fed pipe into the pond. Consideration to an upstand pipe. sited in the pond and below the gabion basket weir will retain the pond water level below the full pipe inlet. The upstand pipe will bypass the weir and discharge into the weir continuously.

"The council has \$6m set aside over three years for a Whangamatā stormwater upgrade and your Community Board and Councillors are trying to get that project included in the next Annual Plan.

"Your voice here today and through direct or media helps get out the message to Council to support this

"The over-topping of the wastewater plant is a direct effect of stormwater entering through the gullet traps and resulted in the beach and

harbour restrictions on swimming.

"Most of this stormwater is from the low lying ponding areas in town and we need to get this stormwater upgrade actioned to support these ratepayers and residents.

"Eric Thorne was a sewer and water engineer for 40 years, and had trained many engineers on storm water design, Eric's take on this was "this pond is meant to work, by the water coming into it, through the pond and disappearing out to sea, through the sand, the theory is really good, but this sort of silt reduces its capacity, I'm guessing by over 1,000 times or at least 100 times, so it's not going to work, unless you keep getting the sand out. Suggestions made of cleaning it out every five years, I would say that's grossly too long, and probably should be considered annually"

Thorne also stated "the sand is going down through the holes on the joints on the pipes, like an hourglass, but it just keeps on going, 365 days of the year." He also said "I disagree, and quite strongly, that the idea that everyone should pipe their water into the storm water system will overload the storm water system and I believe it will probably make the situation worse, not better".

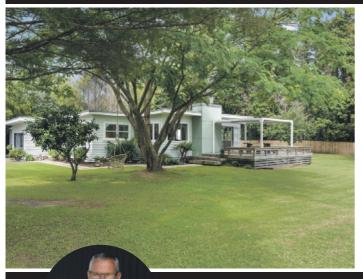
Thorne also added "I'm unsure how they came to determine the height of the weir, a weir protects the sea from getting in, but they don't think about the water trying to get from the pond out, likely at the same time, so lowering the weir? Yes, but it needs some real thought".

Whangamatā News acknowledges the case here is "priority and resilience, we are heading for another weather event, be safe everyone, don't point blame, and be proactive with your homes in our low lying areas, especially around the Williamson Golf Course. Join the Ratepayers and voice your concerns through them."
