Government to deliver responsible Budget next week

On 22 May, Finance Minister Nicola Willis delivered the Budget 2025, which will confirm our Government's commitment to responsible economic management.

The annual Government Budget sets out how taxpayer's money will be invested, as well as outlining the Government's areas of priority. An uncertain global economic outlook, combined with the hangover from years of reckless spending by the previous government, mean that this year's Budget will not be a lolly scramble

Since 2019, Government debt has increased from \$58 billion to \$175 billion in 2024. That amounts to \$22,000 more in debt for every New Zealander. Servicing the interest on that debt cost us \$8.9 billion last year, which is more than we spend on Police, Corrections, the Ministry of Justice, Customs and the Defence Force combined.

Those figures make for sobering reading, but there is reason for optimism. As a Government,

we're committed to reducing debt through prudent and careful spending choices. The economy is also steadily recovering and inflation in under control.

Budget 2025 is another step to that recovery, and it will continue our responsible and predictable approach to managing the economy, with an emphasis on supporting economic growth.

We've already made some pre-Budget announcements which will make a meaningful impact in the areas most important to New Zealanders. From 1 July, we are funding teacher registration and practising certificates which will save teachers up to \$550. This initiative will benefit around 40,000 fulltime and part time school and early learning teachers in the first year, growing to around 115,000 across three years.

More will be announced when the Budget is delivered this week.



Cornerstone Consecration


Sunday, 25 May, will see the consecration of the Anglican Church building at its usual worship service time of 9am.

Whangamata Community Pool seeks sustainable funding

The Whangamata Real Estate Community Swimming Pool is facing a critical funding challenge as its management committee appeals for sustainable operational support to keep the facility running smoothly in the years ahead.

Committee Chair Rob Boston recently submitted a formal request to Thames-Coromandel District Council (TCDC) Chief Executive Aileen Lawrie, highlighting the committee's progress in strengthening the pool's long-term viability.

Following a significant refurbishment program, the pool now meets key operational standards, including regulatory staffing compliance, improved governance, and updated financial systems.

"With these milestones achieved, we believe the timing was right to submit our Finance Application," Boston said. "Our goal is to secure reliable operational funding to ensure the pool continues to serve the community well into the future."

The committee had hoped the application would be included in TCDC's 2025 Annual Plan.

However, the final plan focused on three district-wide priorities: the rates review, water services, and kerbside rubbish collection. As a result, the pool's application was not included for formal consideration this year.



In her reply, Aileen Lawrie acknowledged the value of the facility and the proactive steps taken by the committee but explained that the Council is operating under significant financial constraints.

Council has been directed to reduce its operational budget by \$1.7 million for the upcoming year, despite inflationary pressures on costs across the board.

"These sorts of funding decisions are beyond staff authority," Lawrie said. "We simply don't have the budget flexibility at present, but that doesn't mean there aren't options."

Lawrie encouraged further

discussions among councillors and suggested that support could still be explored through informal channels or future Annual- Long Term Plan processes. She also noted that public forums remain an avenue for raising the issue with elected representatives.

A stakeholder meeting held on 29 April brought together local councillors, Council staff, and members of the Whangamata Community Board. While attendees expressed broad support for the pool, the timing of the application was again highlighted as a barrier to immediate inclusion in this year's plan.

The pools proposed Finance
Application was circulated to
Councillors and a presentation made
in Public Forum on 13 May, this
proposal included a revised funding
proposal to assist with operational
expenditure through to June
2026. We appreciated Councillors
engaging with the presenters,
seeking clarification on several
points

In the meantime, the committee is investigating other funding opportunities, including potential external grants and sponsorships. Internal discussions have also begun around possible costsaving measures, such as reduced operating hours and staffing adjustments, though Boston emphasized that these are not preferred options.

"We are determined to find a way forward," Boston said. "We want to work constructively with Council and the community to secure a funding model—similar to the one used for the Thames Centennial Swimming Pool—that ensures this vital facility remains accessible for all."

As discussions continue, the community is being encouraged to stay engaged and support efforts to keep the pool open seven days a week.

Fair rates: What are they? Who decides?

Council's 2025 Rating Review (rate burden distribution) finished last week. Our Councillors will deliberate (decide) on the outcome next month, 12 June, 2025. Its primary focus was a proposed change from Land Value (LV) to Capital Value (CV) based ratings. This article, an abbreviated version of a detailed public submission, outlines why maintaining LV is the best TCDC ratepayer solution, whilst outlining future recommended rating considerations.

POLITICAL BIAS

TCDC's consultation documentation refers to subjective, value-based (political) reasons such as "fairer", "fairer outcomes", "wealth", and that other councils have moved to CVbased ratings, to support a biased (recommended) change from LV to

By statute, TCDC's consultation documentation must be transparent (and objective). It was not.

The Local Government (Rating) Act 2002 (LGRA) does not explicitly codify fairness, equity, transparency, or affordability rating principles. These principles are implicitly embedded in a combination of LGRA and the Local Government Act 2002 (LGA) (see table below).

Several councils have, over time, moved from LV to CV, but not all. There is a reason for that Most such councils are characterised by population growth, relatively homogeneous property profiles, full-time residents, and increased density (suburban areas). Simply arguing that TCDC should move to CV because others are doing it is not a valid argument. More

importantly, it fails to recognise and account for TCDC's unique ratepayer profile compared with the "others".

A dominant TCDC Ratepayer Class:

Absentee batch owners paving full rates but only using infrastructure and services for a short(er) period. District-wise, they represent more than half (+50%) of our 28,508 rateable properties (SUIPs) (Separately Used or Inhabited (rating) Unit) (TCDC figure per Nov 2024). In some Eastern areas, the figure is closer to 70%!

They provide a fiscal injection of money to our district, not just in rate income, but in economic activity and jobs. Many places in our district would not enjoy today's infrastructure without absentee batch owners.

Nationwide, only selective parts of Marlborough District and the Far North District have such a skewed ratepayer profile. For TCDC, the

profile is district-wide!

Fact: Absentee batch owners already shoulder a disproportionate part of our rate burden today (they do not stress our infrastructure assets and services similar to fulltime residents). It follows that they pay disproportionately more than the benefit they enjoy. This conflicts with s 101(3) LGA - Funding Principles: Distribution of benefits (those who benefit more should contribute more).

A change from LV to CV further compounds this skewness in rate burden distribution.

RECOMMENDATION

For now, TCDC must maintain status quo for rate distribution, providing stability and certainty to all ratepayers.

A Thorough Review: A Required **Rates Reset**

Presently, Whangapoua to Whangamatā pay 75% of all rates.

In the medium term, we should, for rating purposes, divide our district into geographical areas aligned with our Community Board structure, presently five areas (possibly differentiating between Pauanui and Tairua in the future). Each area should have specific rates and charges that reflect the services provided and the needs of the community within that area.

Rate Components

Simplified, TCDC rates should be easily identifiable and comprise:

- General Rates: Uniform or variable per rateable LV dollar value with variable rates (rating differentials) based on land use, area, location, and provision for ability to connect to Council-provided services;
- Targeted Rates: Applied for specific services or projects benefiting particular areas or groups (water supply, sewerage, stormwater management, or a requested activity that an area wants and is prepared to pay for).
- Uniform Annual General Charge (UAGC): A fixed charge applied to all rateable properties to fund general services (roads, etc.).

A Novel Idea

Rates are a land tax. Not a progressive income tax. An alternative proposal for a fair, simple and transparent rate burden distribution is analogous to a club membership. A club where all members essentially pay the same membership fee (children pay less, some family rebates, etc.). In this case, the club is called "Property Ownership".

We (TCDC) must go back to the drawing board. We need a balanced, thorough rates review debate and consultation. This is too important to get wrong. Too important to rush. We need a rates reset.



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WSLSC wraps season of lifesaving, leadership & legacy

As the 2024/2025 surf lifesaving season ends, Whangamatā Surf Lifesaving Club celebrates a year marked by dedication, resilience, and progress on a transformative rebuild that will serve the community for decades.

Despite operating without a functional clubhouse, the club's spirit remained strong. From rescues to recordbreaking sporting achievements, this season proved that people and purpose are the heart of the club.

At the annual prizegiving, top honours went to Daniel Lewis, awarded both Volunteer of the Year and U19 Volunteer Lifeguard of the Year for 500 patrol hours. Danielle Ellery was named Junior Surf Contribution of the Year and Instructor of the Year, while Lily Taylor received Paid Lifeguard of the Year. Megan Luke won Ocean's Athlete of the Year, and Madison Kidd, after breaking her own world record at the World Championships, was named Overall Sportsperson of the Year. Patrol Team of the Year went to Romeo Patrol, led by Jaeden Waldron-Lemon and Ayla Davie.

The Junior Surf awards celebrated younger members' contributions, while the Search and Rescue Squad continued its vital work year-round, including rescuing three kayakers blown out to sea. Rachel Luke earned SAR Contribution of the Year, and Nathan Hight was elected to the Board of Surf Life Saving New Zealand.

The club's major redevelopment, Project Transform, is nearing completion but now faces delays due to deterioration in six key structural columns. The original repair plan was rejected, prompting a full replacement with long-life steel beams—extending their life to over 70 years and lowering future maintenance costs.

"Project Transform is more than a building—it's a symbol of our club's growth," says Board Chair Gavin Scott.

While fundraising and sponsor loyalty have kept the club financially steady, final-stage pressures mean now is the time to donate. Help complete the project and create a facility the Whangamatā community can be proud

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People regularly ask how busy we have been over the holiday period. Between 24 December, 2024, and 25 March, 2025, we attended 25 call-outs for assistance, up slightly from previous years. This also resulted in 52 people returned safely to their families.

From these calls for assistance, it is apparent that we need to remind all boaties of the following:

It is important for all boaties to remember that after your vessel has been unused over the winter period, a service check on motors, fuel, boat batteries, safety equipment should be done before venturing out.

Also, it is important to utilise Coastguard for recording Trip Reports. This can be done via the Coastguard App or via Marine VHF Radio (Whangamatā utilises Ch04).

Coastguard recommends the primary method of communication at sea, via Marine VHF Radio.

Communication utilising Marine VHF enables a wider audience to listen to calls and possibly provide assistance until Coastguard Whangamatā arrives on scene..

So why is a Trip Report important - if you don't return and becomes a search issue, they provide critical information for Coastguard/Police



to activate searches. Trip reports can be done free of charge, whether you are a member or a non-member of Coastquard.

It should be noted that if you require coastguard assistance, it is free for members. Non-members are charged a cost recovery fee of \$350 + GST per hour (minimum 1 hour).

A recent case was a call from a concerned father, whose son was 4 hours overdue. No trip report completed, not answering cellphone. He was going diving from his Jet ski between Whangamatā Harbour and Tairua, possibly going around

Slipper Island... So, where do you start looking? Basically, in this case we would have to report the incident to the Police and request an aerial search.

Luckily, in this case, he arrived back at Whangamatā soon after, negating the need to start a search, with a flat cellphone battery. Coastguard recommends 2 types of communication on board and with cost effective USB cellphone chargers available, this is a simple option to ensure your cellphone battery doesn't go flat.

Coastguard also utilises technology which allows us to send a text

message, with a link to a cellphone and on clicking the link, the GPS position of the cellphone is provided back to Coastguard. This provides a critical piece of information for our crews, as a starting point for a search.

Do you see what I see?

When Tairua intuitive artist Jessie Macaw begins work on a new painting she has no specific idea what the finished piece will look like. That's where the intuitive part comes in. As Jessie layers her painting she starts to see things in the composition...maybe a dog's ear or a cat's eye. But then again it might be a fish, whale or a rooster.

During the course of painting, Jessie will often have two to three paintings underway. She starts by brushing colours across the canvas, warm and cool colours, then whites, blacks and glazes. Next she'll glue on some cotton material and paper for texture. "Golden acrylics are my favourite to work with. I like the transparency they bring when building layers."

"Intuitive painting is about the journey not the destination," says Jessie. The next stage is like a



discovery of what she can see. She'll take a seat and look back at a canvas for fragments of detail that will guide her on, and depending on her mood, it will happen on this canvas, but it just as easily might be on one of the other canvases in progress. What she sees won't

all come at once; they're like visual jigsaws where she gradually places the next piece by letting the curves, colours and flow of the painting lead bor.

"How do you know when you're finished a piece?" I ask.

"I sit and look at the painting and if my eyes don't get stuck on a particular point, then I know it's finished. One canvas I was working on sat there for about five years and I kept going back to it adding layer after layer until one night I thought 'oh my gosh there's a cat' and so on"

Today Jessie's paintings, which she describes as quirky and fun, are selling relatively quickly and she can now say she's a professional artist. "I love it when I hear people laugh as they look at my paintings; they get it."

Thanks to exhibiting in her first Art Escape approximately 18 months ago, and with the encouragement of Whitianga Art Gallery owner and fellow artist Monique Rush, Jessie started to sell her paintings.

At last year's Whitianga Lions Art Expo Jessie sold several of her works and enjoyed interacting with the public and other artists, though she admits she generally prefers to be in the background. At the Whitianga Lions Art Expo this year however, with the confidence she has gained in her ability, she has agreed to be one of the Artists in Show. You can watch her at work on Sunday, June 1 from 1pm-4pm in the Whitianga Town Hall. Entry is free and all money raised over King's Birthday Weekend is going to the

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Waihi Gold Mines Sky Tower Challenge

Ask a Waihi Gold Mines Rescue team member how many stairs they climb in the Sky Tower Stair Challenge and they'll likely say they don't know. "You take a breath, put your head down and start climbing—two steps at a time—using your arms to pull yourself up," says team member Shay Perkinson. "You pace yourself, control your breathing, but you don't count."

There are 51 flights and 1,103 steps, but that's not what's on their minds. What they do feel is the 25 kilograms of gear they carry to the top

"We climb with a BG4, a self-contained breathing system used in environments where the air isn't safe to breathe," explains Shay. Unlike the more familiar firefighter's BA sets, the BG4 recycles the user's breath, scrubbing out carbon dioxide. "The chemical reaction makes the air hot, so it's not easy breathing on the way

The Waihi team is one of over 250

from around New Zealand taking part in the annual challenge on Saturday 24 May. Last year, they placed fifth in fundraising, while OceanaGold's Macraes team came fourth. Together they helped raise over \$110,000 of the \$1.9 million total. Waihi's Jenna Powell came second in the women's overall category on her debut climb. Paul Sharfe, Jed Moriarty, and Josh Foster were second-fastest overall as a team

This year Waihi's team is smaller, but fundraising remains strong. Macraes is currently third, with Waihi close behind in fourth. Shay himself sits third in the country for individual fundraising—though he won't boast about it.

"Fundraising is just as tough as the training," he says. "But we're lucky to have the support of generous local businesses, individuals, and larger sponsors outside Waihi."

The event raises funds for Leukaemia and Blood Cancer New Zealand. "We all know someone touched by cancer," Shay says. "Every day, eight Kiwis are diagnosed with blood cancer. A few minutes of sweaty discomfort is a small way we can help."

Girls just wanna have fun... on roller skates!

Every Thursday evening, the Waihi Events Centre comes alive with music, laughter, and the whoosh of roller skates. It's the weekly gathering of the Waihi Wonder Wheels—a women's roller skating group offering fun, fitness, and a strong sense of connection.

The group began in late 2023 when local skating enthusiast Kathy Alexander posted in a community Facebook forum, asking if any other women were keen to give skating a go. Her dream was simple: create a safe, welcoming space where women aged 18+ could roll together, free of pressure or judgement.

The response was immediate and overwhelmingly enthusiastic. Within weeks, the first session was held at the St John Church Hall but since then, the group has found its groove at the Waihi Events Centre, with a regular crew of 10–12 skaters (but as many as 20) who turn up each week.

Some are complete beginners, others are reliving their roller disco days, and a few bring serious skills—



like Lyn Randall, a former roller derby skater from the UK who's helped shape the supportive, skillssharing culture that defines the Wonder Wheels.

Entry is just \$5 to cover the venue. All that's required is a pair of skates, a helmet, safety pads—and a dash of courage. Each week has a themed twist, from crazy hats to "wear something you love but never dare to." It's light-hearted and always fun.

When I visited the group recently, I was struck by the friendly, encouraging atmosphere. Music played, conversations flowed, and the space felt truly inclusive. Whether you're hugging the wall or cruising with confidence, there's space for you here.

"It's more than skating," one member said. "It's a way to feel free, move your body, and meet great people." "It's really about more than skating," says another. "It's about showing up, being seen, and doing something just for you." Whether you're steady on skates or clinging to the wall, Waihi Wonder Wheels is about self-expression, and pure comradery. It's a reminder that simple fun is for everyone—and sometimes, it rolls in on four wheels.

Waihi Wonder Wheels isn't about being a perfect skater—it's about showing up, rolling forward, and enjoying the ride. If you've been waiting for a sign to dust off your skates or try something new, this might be it. The Wonder Wheels are ready to welcome you—with smiles, support, and plenty of laughs.



Jumpstart Navigators gear up for year of success

The Waihi-based Community **Jumpstart Driver Training** Programme has entered its fourth year, continuing to support local students and residents in gaining their restricted driver's licences through a partnership between OceanaGold, Waihi Police, Waihi College, Blue Light, and trained community volunteers.

The programme, which began in 2022, offers free driving lessons to those who may not have access to a licenced driver or a reliable vehicle. Lessons are held during or outside school hours, with scheduling designed to minimise disruption to learning. The vehicle is provided and maintained by OceanaGold, and all volunteer Navigators are policevetted and trained through Blue Light, a charity working with Police to support youth development.

Recently, the Navigators took part in a training session with Gavin from Thames Valley Driving School to prepare for the year ahead. Phil Salmon, Community Development Advisor for OceanaGold, praised their commitment. "It always impresses me how our volunteers continually seek to upskill and provide the best service they can to the Waihi community," he said.



As of January 2025, 117 people have earned their restricted licences through the programme, supported by more than 1,200 driving sessions.

Waihi College Careers Co-ordinator Carolyn Graveson said the programme addresses a real need. "Many young people, especially in rural areas like Waihi, are disadvantaged by the lack of public transport. Without a licence, they often can't access jobs or training,"

The programme emerged from discussions between OceanaGold and Waihi College as a way to support students in the transition to work. It has since grown to include other community members.

Phil Salmon said the programme reflects a wider community effort. "As a community, we need to work together to do everything we can to provide a pathway to success

for students who have often had their fair share of failure and disappointment. Providing a vehicle may seem like a small thing, but in towns like Waihi, getting your driver's licence is a major building block for future success.'

Waihī Beach surf lifeguard Max Morley has been awarded Top Male Candidate at the 2025 Intermediate Lifeguard School for the Surf Lifesaving Eastern Region - a significant achievement in one of the movement's most respected youth development programmes.

The three-day school, held at Mt Maunganui, brought together 29 young surf lifeguards from across the Eastern Region to take part in intensive training and leadership development. Scenarios included board and rock rescues, jet ski operations, missing person searches, and advanced first aid, alongside workshops with Police, St John, Search and Rescue, and Fire & Emergency.

Max's selection for the top award was based on his strong surf skills, leadership, and ability to perform under pressure – qualities that stood out across a weekend filled with challenge and teamwork.

A student at Waihi College, Max is part of a well-known surf lifesaving family. His mother Kate, a teacher at the college, is a qualified lifeguard and surf boat rower. His father Chris is part of the club's Search and Rescue Squad and a qualified IRB and jet ski operator. His older



brother Leo is a senior lifeguard and surf sports competitor who recently served as Deputy Head Guard during the summer patrol season. Sister Rosie has also been actively involved as a lifeguard, junior surf coach, and surf athlete, currently studying at university.

Max's achievement is a reflection not just of talent, but of the powerful development opportunities that surf lifesaving provides for young people. Programmes like ILGS are about more than just rescue skills – they build confidence, communication, and leadership under pressure.

They also open doors into future pathways, with many lifeguards going on to careers in emergency services, health, outdoor education and beyond.
