## Improving student achievement

For too many primary school children our education system is failing them. The ability to read, write and count are basic life skill tools that every child needs to have if they are to achieve the best outcomes in adult life.

In recent decades educational standard have been slipping. It's not something that has just happened overnight. It's been a long, slow but steady decline. Over the last few weeks, Education Minister Erica Stanford has signalled the coalition Government's priority to raise student achievement.

Doing so is something my National Party colleagues and I campaigned on strongly during last year's election.

The Minister has announced a renewed focus on structured literacy, which in effect is a return to the tried-and-true methods of teaching children how to read and write. When I went to school it was called 'phonics'. From Term 1 in 2025 all state schools will be using the structured literacy approach, which we believe will make a real difference to the learning outcomes of our children.

Presently, only 56% of Year 8 students are at the expected level for reading and writing. We're committed to turning this around and have set a target to get 80% of Year 8 students to curriculum level by 2030. The return to proven education methods, as well as requiring schools to teach an hour each of reading, writing, and maths, will play a big part in better preparing kids for the future.

And on the general subject of education, I've been getting very positive feedback about the ban on cell phones in classrooms. It came into effect at the beginning of this school term. I've heard that it's being received exceptionally well not only with parents and teachers but also actually surprisingly within the large number of school pupils who want to focus on their studies. Removing the distraction of phones has worked overseas, with countries reporting higher engagement and improved achievement.



## Workshops and meetings defined

In response to the *Whangamatā News* article 'Williamson Park to have a Wetland' published 19 April.

It is accepted that Whangamatā needs its stormwater problems to be resolved. As lay people in the field of stormwater, we must accept advice from civil engineers who are experts in this field.

It is accepted that the work plans of years ago were not properly attended to, but we must do our best with the current circumstances we face and the available money.

Council staff have had several studies done with engineers as mentioned and a working group to include Rob Boston, lan Holloway, Eric Thorn (a retired civil engineer with storm water experience) and Councillor Walker attended some meetings.

What needs to be corrected is how local government works. Council meetings are open to the public where councillors vote on resolutions following staff advice, reports, and debate. The motion is moved there is a seconder, and the majority can pass the resolution. That agenda is on the Councils website and the public can attend council meetings by video link. On some

issues that are of a confidential nature, usually commercial matters, the public is excluded for that part of the meeting.

There has been discussion as to workshops and that staff are voting on what is to be done. Let us quote what standing orders say about Workshops.

"Workshop means in the context of standing orders a gathering of elected members for the purpose of considering matters of importance to the Local authority at which no decisions are made and which these standing orders will not apply, unless required by the local authority.

Workshops may include nonelected members. Workshops may be described as briefings."

The problem the Ombudsman addressed was workshops of elected members with no public present relating to 8 councils it appears had been making decisions, or directions at those meetings it was not entitled to. At TCDC workshops the agenda at the top of the page in capital letters states: NO DECISION CAN BE MADE AT WORKSHOPS.

Input was required from the community as mentioned above for the working group as above

also friends of Williamson Park were contacted through Councillor Gotlieb. One of their members is a civil engineer with considerable experience in stormwater. Craig made some suggested improvements which were taken on board by council officers. Eric Thorn, who is overseas, was kept informed of all these matters and on the 18 April responded that he was in favour of the proposed wetlands and offered a few minor suggestions which have been taken on board. He has again on 29 April reaffirmed his support of the wetland proposal.

From the best advice the wetlands proposal seems to be the way to go, and this can be seen as an operational matter that the staff deal with. If we continue to oppose, I expect the staff will proceed in any event (to not to do so will result in funding being withdrawn and it may take some time to have funding approved again) but it has been Councils wish to involve the community.

As stated earlier, as lay people we need to take advice from the experts, and it appears they all agree to proceed with the wetland proposal.

## Open letter



A response to TCDC's advertorial 'Our Coromandel' on page 13 of the 19 April edition of Whangamatā News.

The advertorial states plans will be available later this year presumably for public consultation with works beginning 1 July, 2024. How is council expecting the public to provide input when the works have already started.

The editorial omits that council has decided a wetland is to be constructed inside Williamson Park and that progress is at the stage tenderers have already met on site. The 2018 Opus report into what can be done with Williamson Pond provided 3 options and that the public need to be informed as any decision would be contentious. Being contentious would mean the significance and engagement policy would be at the highest level and community must be involved in any decision. It appears that our elected members were not told of this decision or that other options had been tabled until April 2024. The recent Community Board meeting was a live action show where council admitted it was not engaging with stakeholders because they were under instructions from senior staff not to.

We have been members of what the advertorial states as a 'working group of residents' since April 2023. Our role

was two of three stakeholder representatives selected from the Whangamata Stormwater Action Group to participate in a series of workshops to produce a master plan by 23 November, 2023, to be included in the LTP draft giving community time for consultation before any work is started.

Workshops were to examine the benefits, pros and cons, of stormwater improvement options to then go to full council meetings where elected members then decide what choices would be included in the 2024/2034 LTP for community to be consulted on. The workshop is the engagement process. Council has instead made its own decision and refused to discuss at least three alternate options put forward by stakeholders and is proceeding with a wetland completion date June, 2024.

Making decisions in workshops is unlawful. We understand LGNZ is currently providing advice to

lan and I have withdrawn from the workshops as we can no longer support councils' failure to engage, failure to be transparent, provide documents and making this unlawful decision.

It's time to consider what the residents and ratepayers of the town want.

## TCDC Responds

TCDC has responded to the Whangamatā News article in our 19 April edition regarding the Williamson Park pond.

The Williamson Park area has been a key focus for our Council due to issues with flooding. The existing pond was originally designed to be a soakage basin, with a spillway outlet. However, the existing pond provides a long water retention time which results in settlement of sediments and potential for growth

The solution developed for Williamson Park, which has been designed by professionally qualified engineering consultants, allows for water to be transferred via a wetland area and then dispersed out to sea. The wetland area is part of the stormwater quality treatment systems designed to handle sediments. The objective is that water ponding will still occur during peak weather events but will dissipate after a short retention time. This solution has been discussed at a recent meeting

of a community engagement team which was formed to gain community input into the work.


This engagement team includes three representatives of the Whangamatā Ratepayers Association, two community members who are civil contractors with experience of the Williamson Park pond (but who are not contracted to Council), a member of the Whangamatā Community Board, a Councillor and our Council Water Services Manager. Of the seven community representatives, five are supportive of the solution. Waikato Regional Council have confirmed they are supportive of this solution and that it meets their stormwater guidelines.

The objective is that this solution will be implemented by June 2024. As the design is subject to a commercial tender process, we are unable to provide costings.







# Tournament raises funds for flood works



A flood-prone provincial Kiwi golf club has raised some \$65,000 from a tournament to assist in implementing a major water mitigation programme which will see a network of natural creeks running through the course cleared of weeds impeding the smooth flow of rain run-off in winter.

Whangamata Golf Club in the Coromandel has regularly flooded over the past few winters as the effects of rain deluges are compounded by the growth of weeds and vegetation within the multiple creeks winding their way through the course's low-lying fairways... which are sometimes drowned under 1.5 metre ponds during heavy rain spells.

Even during 'normal' flow periods, the Wentworth River and its tributary creeks create water hazards alongside 15 of the club's low-lying holes. Bridges – many of which were close to the end of their life expectancy and were severely damaged by previous flooding – criss cross over from several of the course's adjoining fairways.

Whangamata Golf Club has a \$500,000 flood resilience reparation budget over the next five years – with expenditure being equally split between drainage construction and bridge installation in a phased programme.

To help fund the works programme, in addition to running two raffles

with the top lure of a luxury travel package to watch the famed Masters championship at Augusta National Golf Club in Georgia, USA, the Whangamata Golf Club also held a traditional Ambrose golf day with golfing memorabilia auction this month – which attracted some 80 players from across the Coromandel Peninsula, the Bay of Plenty, and the Waikato.

Whangamata Golf Club manager James Beston said the club realized that while the dual high-profile Masters raffle promotions had a nationwide appeal for incredible prizes they offered, it was also important to remember that local 'grass roots' fundraising events such as a stock-standard Ambrose golf tournament were fundamental to bringing in the dollars.

Ironically, the first half of the Water Be Gone Ambrose tournament was played in torrential rain after a delayed start, until the sun burst through the clouds and the second half of the event was played in glorious sunshine and sweltering temperatures, albeit on soaked fairways and greens.

"We need \$38,000 to clear the course creek beds and drains of weed and vegetation growth in time for this winter's scheduled rainfall. What better time to get those funds rolling in than with winter now on the horizon," said Beston.

# "I really love aged care - it's my passion"

Whangamatā News had the distinct pleasure of catching up with Deborah Padfield, the new GM of Moana House & Village.

Deborah has been in the role since April 16th, she came from Wales nearly 9 years ago, using her skills as a Mental Health Social worker once in Auckland, and then on to manage and transition large aged care facilities and medical centres on the North Shore for some years.

"Aged care has been with me for more than 20 years in some format." Now living at Waihi Beach, she saw a Seek advert for the position here in Whangamatā. She felt there was a reason for it, and two interviews later, here she is.

When asked what challenges and opportunities she sees for Moana House "I think there are both, I think the challenges here is that we are in a small community and we have to draw in the community, but in order to draw the community, Moana House has to give to the community".

"I'm looking at how we can incorporate more, we are a Trust, people think we have money, but that's not the case, which means we still have to tap on doors."

It's obvious that Moana House gets financial income from the DHB, but it's never enough, it never meets the needs of what they do.

Staffing levels, repairs, maintenance and the building is aging. Deborah is looking at how to engage local people, should they choose to work there, Deborah stated "we need to support the ladies and gentlemen here, drawing from the pool of

expertise in the local community first, but also looking at sourcing those nurses from overseas, internationally, they also are bringing great skills into New Zealand".

When I asked how she was fitting into the big family of Moana House, "I think I'm a source of amusement at the moment, it's the accent, I love asking lots of questions, for me it's getting to know them, forming an understanding, getting out and about with our ladies and gentlemen, our marvellous, helpful staff, the incredible volunteers. I feel like I'm building a foundation of relationships, the love for Moana House is here".

I discussed with Deborah, what volunteers could we use presently? We went for a walk and I tell you,,,being an avid gardener myself, the vege patch has gone to a great patch of nothing, not a brassica in sight, a lonely shovel, a mound of what once was... imagine if some clever, gardener volunteers could offer their time for a veg patch! Fresh, home grown delights harvested at will!

If you can help, please call, all ideas welcome, perhaps a wee stall 'Moana Veg & Care'.

Welcome to our paradise, Deborah - we look forward to our community getting to know you.

# Kiwi Juniors start strong at the ISA Junior World Champs

Two of our Whangamata Area School students, Harrison Biddle and Lola Groube are in the team, now in El Salvador representing New Zealand at these 2024 ISA World Junior Surfing Champs.

It is the Under 16 Girls division that sees the most experience come into play with Alani Morse and Lola Groube returning for another year at the ISA World Junior Champs.

Groube, who was the star of the New Zealand team in 2023 placed 19th. With multiple titles to her name, her performances this season bode well for an excellent World Junior Champs campaign.

The New Zealand junior Surfing Team had an excellent start to their World Junior Surfing Championships campaign early on day one of the event with Taimana Marupo (Mnt) and Indi Lee Ruddell (Whng) winning their first-round matchups.

In the Under 16 girls' division Alani Morse (Rag) placed second and Tai Murphy in the U18 boys after their first foray into the water.

After a long day participating in the opening ceremony, where A staggering 441 of the world's best junior surfers gathered to celebrate the opening of the 2024 ISA World Junior Surfing Championship (WJSC).

The groms got straight into business with the Under 18 boys division taking to the water. A record breaking 54 teams are attending the event this year making it one of the biggest World Junior Championships ever.

Six of the twelve Kiwis competed on day one with The Under 18 Girls and Under 16 Boys having a lay day.

It was Taimana Marupo of Mount Maunganui up first for the New Zealand team contesting the U/18 Boy's Main Round 1 at La Bocana. Up in heat 2 he astonished the judges and the crowd with 12.77 heat total including a left and a solid overhead right hander that he tore to pieces, scoring a mid-range seven, he continued to keep busy

in the historically shifty waves of La Bocana, securing the win and advancing to the next round. On his win and his debut in the New Zealand team, Marupo commented "I was super stoked to get that good wave, gave me a lot of confidence, it's been fun..."

At the same time Indi Lee Ruddell of Whangarei was surfing in Round 1 of the U/16 Girls division at podium 2 in El Sunzal. Ruddell also found success on debut. "I was pretty nervous to start with, but once I got my first waves the nerves settled and I got into work, im stoked to

get through the opening round and can't wait for my next heat!" Indi Lee dominated her opponents of Canada and Guatemala taking out the heat with a massive lead and an 8.5 heat total.

Surfing soon after, Tai Murphy of Whakatāne took to the water where he placed 2nd with a 11.33 heat total. "Surfing in front of an international audience is pretty different, it's eye opening and intense but I'm really happy with my performance, bring on round 2".

As Whangamatā News went to print on Monday, 6 May, this update

came in: In the Under 16 girls division, it was Lola Groube who opened the day in the calm morning conditions. A 1-2m swell with no wind saw Lola take firstround win in the famed El Sunzal. Although low scoring it was a tight battle between the Kiwi, Canadian and Guatemalan which eventually saw Lola take the win with a pair of mid-range 3s. "I've had a dream start to the event and It's great to be back surfing on the world stage Groube commented, it's so cool to have the opportunity to surf and be challenged by other girls from all around the globe" she added. Groube will surf again in Round 2 Heat 16.

Competition will continue with Boy's U/18 Main Event Round 1 at La Bocana and Girl's U/16 Main Event Round 1 at El Sunzal.

In the New Zealand team, Spencer Rowson surfs in heat 30 of the U/18 Boys Main round and Lola Groube (Pauanui) also will surf in the U/16 Girls Round 1 Heat 30.

In 2023 the New Zealand Team placed tenth overall.

The championship is the largest junior surfing event in the world playing host to over 340 surfers from 44 nations in 2024.

Are you confident in using your smartphone? Are you good at sorting out the minor quirks and issues that seem to quite regularly bug our phones or laptops? Could you help SeniorNet provide this service to the Whangamatā community on an occasional basis?

We are looking for some extra tutors/assistants to do just that! You don't have to be a current member of SeniorNet to volunteer.

SeniorNet has been a part of the community of Whangamatā for over 20 years, providing all manner of training and support in many aspects of our digital lives. It was enthusiastically welcomed as an educational provider to the extent that it was able to acquire its own classroom which is in the grounds of the Whangamata Area School, next door to the swimming pool. In this room, over the years, many residents have been able to learn computing skills, and gain confidence in using computers, Android smartphones and iPhones for all manner of everyday tasks. Everything from operating Microsoft Word, Excel and Publisher, to manipulating photographs and storing them appropriately, to using the increasingly prolific apps on our phones, have been taught at SeniorNet.

We now recognise that residents have increasing demands on their time and to better enable access to the assistance that we can provide to members of our community we are looking at

providing one-on-one tutoring or help sessions. Often our senior citizens can ask family members, particularly grandchildren, to help in this way.

But for those who aren't so lucky, SeniorNet is hoping to provide a service allowing our members to request a short one-on-one session, to solve an immediate issue on their laptop or phone. # Whangamata News Couch to 10km: Run app reviews

With 20 weeks until the G.J. Gardner Homes Whangamatā Half Marathon, Whangamatā News Couch to 10km candidate Liam 'Tusky' Bethell has time to choose a training style to suit his commitments. We'll be looking at goal-setting, nutrition, and physiology with Liam in the build up to the 10km event in September.

At some stage though, Liam will have to start running. How do you start running? Almost every run/ walk event offers some sort of downloadable training plan, but just like everything else in life now there's also an app for that. Actually there are a lot of apps for that. We short-listed three free or affordable run trainer apps that get you from the Couch to 10km. We couldn't decide which one is best - it truly depends on your preferences and what spins your wheels in an app, especially if that involves kittens.

#### **Zenlabs Fitness 10k Trainer**

Pros: Stylish graphic of your run with run/walk time split, distance, steps & calories burned and shareable to social media. Option for map view. Standard three workouts

per week. We really liked the tally of the run sections with "You are on run 1 of 8" announcements

Cons: Only the first two weeks of the 14-week training plan is free. The Pro subscription is affordable at approx \$10 but you'd miss out on the final week of your plan unless you shelled out for the annual sub. Personally we're not big fans of subscription tricks like this.

Overall: This app has a lot of accolades but it seemed to be just like the others - except with a slight subscription con and cute kitten pies to celebrate your workout.

#### **Active.corn Couch to 5k** (followed by 5k to 10k app)

personal trainer, to run from a zombie, or be barked at by an army sergeant? Our child-friendly testing proved the avatar personal trainers were a huge hit. While we enjoyed the gags from Johnny Dead, our testing was not rigorous enough to know if they get a bit repetitive. The app has a nice log view with a summary of your workouts, including total distance plus run/ walk breakdown plus mapping.

Pros: Who doesn't want a unicorn

Cons: This app had a somewhat labour intensive set-up involving account creation, verification hoops to jump through and several permissions to grant before you were up and running, which could be daunting for the technologically challenged.

Overall: We love this app - it's fun with excellent functionality. A big selling point is the 9-week Couch to 5k followed by the 9-week 5k to 10k giving you a gradual 18-week build to your 10km goal. While it has a one-off cost of \$7.99, the follow up app is free. Both have exceptional features for the 3 x workouts per week, and offer social connectivity and an online community.

#### Just Run Zero to 5km (and 10km)

Pros: You can use this app for free! This is the only app we found with no strings attached. Split between a 9-week Zero to 5km plan and 6-week 5km to 10km plan. Our favourite feature was the optional halfway alert, so you'd know when to turn around if you're running out and back. There is a modest upgrade option of \$5.99 if you'd like some more trainer voice options (there's an Irish Liam - lol) and

a different colour scheme; the upgrade ask has a delightful social enterprise vibe of gratitude.

Cons: None. If you're looking for a 100% free couch to 10k run trainer app with the standard three voice prompted workouts per week, this is your best option.

Overall: You can't share your run to social media (gasps) and you don't get a pretty map of where you've run, actually you don't get a lot of information about your past performance except that you've done it. That's the important bit though right? Did we mention it's 100% free, and ad free, for the whole 15 weeks? No upgrade required. Very refreshing.

When you picked up the Whangamatā News today, you may not have known run apps existed. A trainer app can take the guesswork out and help to build your stamina and kilometres gradually and safely, not to mention help to keep you on track - especially through winter.

Irishman Finn McCall was injected into the game for Whangamatā after 45 minutes and his impact was immediately felt with the lock making a long-striding break with his first touch of the ball. He made several more breaks throughout the second half and, as Whangamatā were picking and going near the Mercury Bay try line, he stretched out and scored to make it 10-7 with

Two indiscretions in kickable areas handed the lead back to Mercury Bay after first-five Connor Curran

slotted both penalties. Whangamatā levelled it up with a penalty of their own and then had the chance to snatch it with a penalty on full time. The kick from out wide sailed just past the right upright and the match ended in a 13 all draw.

Two standouts were the aforementioned McCall and Best. Mercury Bay were well served by their half-back Connor McCauley whose crisp passing put his team on the front foot and whose box kicks were tough for Whangamatā to defuse. For Whangamatā Ben Laurie was tireless in his carries and regularly got over the gain line against a confrontational Mercury Bay pack.

## Red n White Irishmen



# Name your craypots and nets or risk losing them

Fishery Officers say they've seized a range of illegal fishing equipment in the Coromandel and are urging fishers to properly name their gear.

"We have over a dozen pieces of equipment - mostly craypots and set nets that we've seized because they were set illegally.

"If you are using craypots or set nets, mark your gear clearly with your initials and surname. Most of the gear we haul out of the ocean is seized because people failed to do

"We've seized a lot of gear and most of the owners never come forward to claim their equipment, so it is eventually destroyed," says Fisheries New Zealand Regional Manager, Fisheries Compliance, Andre Espinoza.

Fishery Officers patrolling the area actively encourage fishers they come across who are heading out to set craypots or nets, to mark their gear with the name and contact details.

"We talk with people, and even carry a marker pen, however fishers need to take responsibility. We're always there to help people understand the rules but will take action to protect the fishery including seizing illegal equipment and issuing infringement notices.



How to name your craypots or nets.

People are encouraged to download the free NZ Fishing Rules mobile app. Once downloaded, the app will also work in areas where you may not have mobile coverage, so you'll have the latest rules and regulations at your fingertips.

Fisheries New Zealand encourages people to report suspected fishing illegal activity through MPI's 0800 4 POACHER number (0800 47 62 24).
