



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Action needed

Climate change is happening and the effects are evident when we watch the news.

Adverse weather events are getting worse. Droughts, cyclones and dangerous heat waves are increasing, and the vast majority of scientists warn that it will only get worse if we don't reduce our greenhouse gas emissions.

Right wing misinformation will try to say that climate politics is simply a Green invention and ignore the fact that organisations, such as NASA, state that there is unequivocal evidence that the earth is warming at an unprecedented rate and that human activity is the principal cause.

Yes, the climate has always changed, but it is now changing at a very dangerous rate. It is undeniable that human activity has produced the atmospheric gas that trapped the sun's energy.

Carbon dioxide from human activities is increasing 250 times faster than it did from natural sources after the last ice age.

Scientists do not ignore "biogenic methane", but as NASA has pointed out the concentration of methane in the atmosphere has almost doubled since the start of the industrial revolution. This increase in methane is responsible for 20% to 30% of the earth's warming.

NIWA and the Ministry for the Environment have produced evidence that most of these methane emissions in NZ come from agriculture. Our current government ignores the weight of this evidence and does nothing to counteract this looming climate disaster.

In the future our children and future generations will pay the price for our blindness and our failure to act in a responsible manner.

Freedom campers response

I saw the article on freedom campers in issue 155. I think it's important to understand a broader perspective of the Beach Road Reserve site. The mud hole displayed in the original article was in fact caused by freedom camper traffic in the first place and was not a mud hole given to folks to camp on. The vast majority of freedom camper's sites across New Zealand and the Coromandel are sensibly located on hard surface areas and not on grass park areas that are not suited to constant traffic. The Beach Road campers are positioned a mere 12 metres from front gates and constant noise and movement is stressful for many. The Beach Road site is constantly abused by campus; exceeding designated

numbers, randomly camping outside of the designated areas, exceeding multiple stay-nights, parking boats and support vehicles alongside their camp vans. Many local residents have been exposed to campers leaving litter, pouring out grey waste water, urinating (and worse publicly). The majority using the site do not meet New Zealand camp vehicle regulations.

I am not against freedom campers but there needs to be a reasonable process in place when establishing camping locations.

Come on Council please locate and designate freedom camping sites in Whangamatā at appropriate and sensible locations such as on hard surfaces, close to toilet and washing facilities and a reasonable distance from residences houses.

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Police report

Another year nearly over and as we enter the holiday season I would like to pass on a sincere thank you to the community from my team and I. There have been some great results achieved through engagement with our community and the confidence of people to speak up when they see or know something is not right.

Unfortunately it is the time of year where popular items that are not put away sometimes go missing due to light fingered people. They are very much the minority though. There will be plenty of Police staff around the peak period to keep everyone safe, please do not hesitate to call 111 if you need Police then and there or 105 (or online to 105) if it is not urgent.

Speaking of great results. Directly as a result of information from many members of our community, Police executed two different search warrants at different addresses in Whangamata on the 10th of December. Police recovered a significant amount of Methamphetamine packaged



and ready for sale to vulnerable members of our community. An arrest was made. Unfortunately, one of the addresses which we knew of prior, is where a young child resides also. I am sure you will join me in labelling these dealers selfish scourge's who have absolutely no place in our community. It is disgusting and will not be tolerated. That makes three different search warrants executed by my team in the last few months. Guess what, more to come. Our confidential informants are still talking to us. Those informants are the heroes here. They have the guts to stand up for their community. If you would like to pass information confidentially to us, pop in and see us. Your identity will be very well protected. If it is preferred, Crime Stoppers online is also a great option to get information through to us.

Over the New Year period we consistently have one major issue. Young persons supplied with alcohol and sent on their way. When we come across these young people, often breaching the liquor ban or involved in some kind of disorder we contact their parents. We find that some parents are sitting in another city and had sent their young ones with friends and their parents. Don't get me wrong, there are plenty of local young persons let loose with alcohol also. The parents' attitudes have been pretty average at best some of the time. The 'She'll be right'. Please keep your young ones close or at least know where they are or going. Have those adult conversations with them. After all they are beginning to learn how to grow into an adult. Remember, alcohol can only be supplied to a person under 18 by their legal guardian, so...Their own parent (not grandparent, uncle or aunty and friends parent). If the young person is legally adopted, then that is the adoptive parents. Pretty black and white and fines for people who supply alcohol illegally apply.

In October 2024, three Kayakers were blown well offshore in what can only be described as horrific sea conditions. A multi agency response kicked into gear. A long time member of the Whangamata community and life member of the Whangamata Surf Club Mr Bryan Black, saw the urgency and without hesitation took his Helicopter to the air, locating one of the Kayakers approximately 6.5 NM off the coast of Whangamata. Because of this all three were rescued. Mr Black received a Police District Commanders Award for his heroic actions at a Gala event at the Whangamata Surf Club a few weeks ago. Well done Bryan and congratulations.

There certainly is no shortage of heroes in our community. In the last few weeks of writing this, an unresponsive swimmer who got caught in a rip was rescued by a local surfer. The person was revived and survived the ordeal. Watch this space.

Coastal areas, due to coastal conditions, are drying out rapidly, which is bringing the fire risk to medium - high. What we need to be cautious of is overcharging battery tools, exhaust on long dry grass, barbecue coal embers and general outdoor fires. Although the above might sound okay to some people, the results can be absolute major.

Awareness is needed to the very highest level.

When travelling on the highways Towing trailers, please be aware of wheel bearings overheating brakes,

these are another cause of grass fires which can spread to large fires. Our firefighters in this region are all volunteers, we all like to have time with family, so please give consideration to what the fire risk is.

We don't only attend fires, medicals, MVAs, but any emergency that we get a call to. Stay safe, and enjoy your holiday break.

Fires can spread very fast and be absolutely devastating to a community. As we see at Tongariro National Park. So please be cautious, and do not hesitate to call 111 fire and doubt.

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Pools vital for survival skills

In a recent NZ Herald editorial, it was reported more than 60 people have drowned in New Zealand waters this year. This number is likely to climb even higher during the upcoming holiday period.



Sadly, thousands of kiwi children do not have the opportunity to learn to swim confidently, or at all. They will enter their adult lives with no idea of how to save themselves should they find themselves out of their depth and struggling to stay afloat.

Before entering the ocean, river or pool, people must know their limits, being able to float is a fundamental basic skill.

Who will teach these skills, as the number of school pools close due to funding restrictions, and lack of suitably qualified staff? ACC has cut its \$1.1 million annual support of Water Safety NZ who provide excellent education programs targeted at teaching these aquatic survival skills to local communities and schools.

Our pool management committee knows firsthand the complexities of running a community pool, funding, staffing, pool management, following H & S requirements, training of staff and meeting community expectations.

Thanks to generous supporters, the pool will remain open every day, with extended hours from 13 December to 31 January 2026 for the busy holiday season.

Weekdays: 6am - 6pm
Saturdays: 7am - 5pm
Sundays: 10am - 5pm

Public Holidays: Open 10am - 5pm, except Christmas Day and Boxing Day, pool is closed

In recent weeks pool staff have in association with Swimming Waikato run a Water Safe programme with approximately 260 year 1-6 students learning water-based skills that will help keep them safe.

Our Learn to Swim program has once again proved popular with 75 youngsters involved, 8 have qualified to join swim club.

Whangamata Amateur Swimming

Club has wound up for the year with 60 active participants, totalling approximately 120 swims a week. These young swimmers show great resilience and commitment, with training sessions scheduled 3 mornings and 4 afternoons a week, several swimmers travel from Tairua, Waihi and Thames to take part.

This year an adult swim fit class was introduced, this proved to be a popular innovation with 15 swimmers taking part.

A wide range of holiday activities are being planned, the regular Aquarobics classes will continue throughout the holiday period every Monday, Wednesday morning 8:00 - 9:00, and Tuesday evenings 5.00 - 5.45pm, except for public holidays, newcomers are welcome.

Competition, due to take place on Saturday 24 and Sunday 25 Jan, more information to be posted on our website

Several Inflatable Days are planned; these are extremely popular and provide lots of fun and challenges for our younger patrons.

For those pool swimmers who are considering ocean swimming right here on our doorstep, a clinic is being planned to assist that transition. This will include coaching and fitness requirements, practicing open water swimming techniques in the pool, choosing and correctly wearing a wetsuit, entering and leaving the ocean and learning to relax in open water.

The pools management committee and staff thank our regular and visitor patrons as well as the user groups who have supported the pool throughout the year.

2026 will be a defining year as we await TCDC's deliberations regarding the future funding of community pools throughout the Coromandel Peninsula.

One thing is certain, if we are serious about reducing the number of preventable drownings, cutting funding is not the answer, we are a country of beaches, rivers and lakes, providing opportunity to learn aquatic survival skills must be supported and encouraged.

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Community Feedback to Help Set Path for New Board

Connecting with its community and providing appropriate and effective engagement, have been identified as two critical objectives of the new Whangamata Community Board.

Having held their first formal, plus several informal meetings, Board members have agreed how they want to work and achieve the best outcomes for their communities.

Mark Dury will chair the board - being in his second term. He is joined by Sally Smith, who is also secretary of Enterprise Whangamatā, Neil Evans undertaking a second term, and former councillor and deputy mayor, Terry Walker.

Alison Smith and John Freer are the district councillors.

Board members want to maximise the opportunity being driven by the new mayor and his councillors to increase the impact of community boards, this including having the chair attend council meetings with speaking rights.

Aligned is the need to now determine the key matters that residents, ratepayers and stakeholders want the board to focus on.

The steps to achieve this have started with board members all being allocated areas of interest across the three communities of Whangamata, Onemana and



Opoutere - examples being who will link and be the key contact with the many groups and clubs that make up the communities.

Primary here are the residents and ratepayer's associations and the local business association which the board hopes to partner with on some initiatives. Added are the many groups, clubs and organisations which cover everything from education to health services, emergency services and sports and recreation.

Feedback on what are the topics which are most top of mind for stakeholders is already underway. Board members want to hear from residents and ratepayers on where they want the board's focus to be applied.

Chairman Mark Drury said holding rate increases to an affordable level was at the top of the list and he is pleased this is also an objective of district councillors.

Mark said board members would now engage with the groups that they had identified to work with to determine the things that community members see as priorities.

"In most cases the board members have agreed to work with groups where they already have a connection - it could be a club, an organisation or a community sector. This way we can use the contacts and links we already have in place."

Mark shares a similar view as other board chairs that the list should

consist of aspects which can be achieved.

As he said there is no point in taking on things that will never be achieved, saying they didn't have the time or the resources.

"Therefore, we don't want to create a huge wish-list and then end up not delivering anything."

The residents and ratepayer's associations will be asked to assist with the gathering of the information and feedback, Mark said board members would attend events and meetings to listen to what people wanted the board to work on.

Information will then be collated by the board members with recommendations back to stakeholders during February.

He said the board was not spending a whole lot of money on this, they did not want to complicate the situation, rather to simply determine what matters to everyone, providing board members with the information to go into the community plan, which will be the guide to delivering what communities wants.

He said all board members are looking forward to working with the many groups and clubs, Mark encouraging people to contact both board members and the councillors.

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Summer services update from Whangamata Medical Centre

As we head into another classic Whangamatā summer, the team at Whangamata Medical Centre would like to extend warm Season's Greetings to our community and visitors. Summer is our busiest time of year, and we want everyone to enjoy a safe and healthy holiday season, so we are sharing a few important updates about our services, hours, and how we can best support you.



The clinic will be closed on Christmas Day and Boxing Day, although a doctor will still be available for emergencies. From 27 December through to 23 January, we will be open 7 days a week. Please note that weekend and Public Holiday appointments incur a 40 dollar after hours fee in addition to standard charges.

We would also like to gently remind our community that Whangamata Medical Centre is not an Accident and Emergency service. As a small rural clinic, we have limited equipment, staffing, and space. Whilst we do manage many urgent issues, there are times, particularly during the summer months, when we may need to redirect people to more appropriate emergency care. Serious or life threatening symptoms such as chest pain,

shortness of breath, severe bleeding, or sudden collapse should always be treated as an emergency and you should call 111 immediately. If you are unsure, please ring the medical centre's urgent care team for advice.

Our Urgent Care Clinic will run daily throughout summer and is triage based, with emergencies seen first. It is not a walk in service, and we ask that all patients phone us before attending so we can safely manage patient flow. At busy times there may be a wait to see a clinician.

A standard GP appointment is 15 minutes, which allows most doctors to safely address 1 to 2 health concerns. If you have several matters to discuss, please book an extended consultation so your doctor has enough time to support

you properly. Extended appointment fees apply. GPs cannot issue repeat prescriptions for casual patients and these require a consultation, with standard visitor fees applying. If you no longer need your appointment, we would appreciate as much notice as possible, as there is always someone who could use that time. Missed appointments without prior cancellation incur a 20 dollar fee.

We encourage everyone to check their prescription needs ahead of the holiday period. Standard prescription requests require 48 hours to process, and requests made through the online patient portal require 72 hours. Same day urgent prescriptions incur a 30 dollar fee. GPs can only issue repeats for long term medications, which must be reviewed every 6 months. Patients can also sign up for MyIndici, our online portal, where you can request prescriptions and view test results.

We are delighted to welcome several new faces to the team this summer. Dr Catherine Carragee joined us in November and will be with us for the next 12 months. We are also pleased to welcome Dr Anjum Rajpura from Canada, who is with us over the holiday period. In January, we look forward to the return of Dr

Ali Hamilton. Many of you may also recognise Luke Phillips, who has joined our administration team over the summer.

To help keep our community safe, we ask everyone entering the clinic to wear a face mask. Patients with viral symptoms will be assessed in our dedicated infection controlled Red Zone, and our triage team will provide instructions. On days of very high demand, we may not be able to see patients who are not enrolled with Whangamata Medical Centre, and we encourage unenrolled patients to contact their usual GP first.

Our aim is to ensure that everyone in Whangamata, whether local or visiting, receives the right level of care at the right time. By phoning ahead, allowing enough time for prescriptions, booking the appropriate appointment, and treating our team with kindness and patience, you help us keep the entire community safe and well. For advice or appointments, please phone 07 865 8032 before coming to the clinic.

From all of us at Whangamata Medical Centre, we wish you a safe, happy, and sun filled summer.

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

We had **110** volunteer lifeguards, who together contributed **3,357** hours on the beach this season. 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
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Contractor in place for Tairua bridge replacement

Another milestone has been reached in Tairua's Pepe Stream Bridge replacement project, with a contract signed for the design, consenting and construction of the new bridge on State Highway 25.

Fulton Hogan will build the new 2-lane bridge, working with engineering consultancy WSP to support the design and preparation of resource consent applications.

"Getting a construction contract in place is a major milestone in the project and now the countdown is on for final design and consenting so we can start building late next year," says NZ Transport Agency Waka Kotahi Regional Manager Infrastructure Delivery Darryl Coalter

"This community has been very patient while we work through the procurement process since

funding was announced last year. It's great to see things are on track, a contractor is in place with some innovative construction plans, and we are less than 12 months out from starting."

The new bridge will replace the single-lane structure, built in 1943, and also the current wooden pedestrian bridge. A 3-metre wide shared path will be on the seaward (eastern) side of the new bridge, and a 1.5-metre footpath on the western side. A pedestrian crossing with a safety refuge is planned near the Pepe Road intersection. The project has a \$22 million budget.

The Fulton Hogan-WSP partnership will now press on with finalising design and consents ahead of

construction expected to start in spring 2026, with traffic on the new bridge by December 2027.

Funding was confirmed last year for the project - as part of a national priority bridge replacement programme - which includes 2 other SH25 Coromandel bridges. It aims to improve safety, efficiency and resilience on the state highway around the peninsula.

Boundary Creek Stream Bridge on the Thames Coast road had a new deck installed recently and is back to 2 lanes, while the single-lane Ramarama Stream Bridge north of Whiritoa will be replaced by a 2-lane bridge when land negotiations are completed.

Mr Coalter says a community

information session is planned for late February to provide more details on the Pepe bridge design, traffic management and other construction details.

SH25 through Tairua will remain open while the new bridge is built and the old one demolished, with occasional brief closures at night.

One of the first tasks will be to install a temporary shared path on the upstream (western) side of the existing bridge, then remove the current shared footbridge.

Meanwhile traffic management staff will again be in place over the summer holidays to assist traffic over the old bridge.

New beams needed for Whangamata bridge



The bridge deck has been removed to reveal further work is needed on the beams.

Deck repairs to the Moana Anu Anu Bridge on SH25 on the outskirts of Whangamata have been extended to include replacing some corroded beams.

The road has been closed to all traffic since 29 October and is now scheduled to be open by 19 December.

The deck on the bridge (also known as the Wentworth Bridge) needs to be replaced, and other strengthening work is being

carried out during the closure.

The need for more extensive work, including replacing 3 corroded beams, came to light once work was well underway. The replacement beams are currently being fabricated.

The detour through Whangamata uses Mayfair Avenue and Martyn Road and adds only a few minutes to normal journey times.

Know your local dog rules

Orange signs denote on lead areas: Your dog must remain on lead for times noted on the sign.

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Whangamata Harbour Birds: The Spur-Winged Plover

The spur-winged plover, also called the masked plover, is another recent self-introduced species from Australia. It was first recorded in New Zealand in the late 1880's near Wanganui and again in 1892 at Hokitika.

The first breeding record here was near Invercargill Airport in 1932. Their numbers grew rapidly from that pairing with about 1250 breeding birds counted within a 16km radius of the original breeding site by 1971. Since then they have colonised the remainder of mainland NZ and nearby off-shore islands as well as the Chathams and Kermedec Island groups. They are abundant in Southland, coastal Otago and Canterbury, Manawatu and southern Wairarapa, and are common elsewhere. Their success is directly linked to the clearing of land for agricultural and urban development. Their Conservation Status is unprotected self-introduced native. They can be seen feeding out on our harbour mudflats and on adjoining grassed areas at times in numbers of up to around twenty. They can also be seen on various town grassed reserves and the two Whangamata golf courses on a regular basis.

Spur-winged plovers are a largish plump wader, with a prominent yellow bill, face mask and wattles. They have black feathering on the crown of the head and hind neck which extends down to become a collar to the sides of the upper breast. The rest of the head neck



and under parts are white and the back and wing covers a uniform light brown. The primary and secondary wing feathers and tail feathers are black and the long yellow spurs that give them their name are located on the carpal joint of each wing. Other distinctive identification features are their call which is best described as a shrill staccato rattle, and its flight which consists of slow shallow beats of its broad rounded wings. These birds fly around a lot at night and their loud raucous calls can be heard over long distances. They are a particularly aggressive species during the breeding season and will protect their territories, driving off other birds by screaming and dive bombing humans and potential predators that threaten their nests and chicks.

Their preferred nesting sites are rough ungrazed open pasture

with an open outlook, but they will also nest on bare ground such as chewed-down turnip and choumoellier paddocks and on shingle riverbeds. Nests are usually simple scrapes in the ground but sometimes lined with small amounts of grass and other vegetation they find nearby. 1-4 eggs are laid, incubated by both parents and hatch at around 30 days. The chicks leave the nest soon after hatching then follow the adults finding their own food. They fledge at about 7-8 weeks old. Their diet on pastureland and plowed paddocks is mainly earthworms, and a variety of adult and larval insects, also some seed and leaves. In tidal areas and other coastal habitats, small crabs, shrimps and shellfish are taken.

Although these plovers have earned the ire of some farmers by their habitat of nesting in open grassed and cultivated paddocks and their

noisy aggressive behaviour, they are a useful natural tool in the control of insect pasture pests such as grass grubs and Porina moth larvae. Unfortunately their preference for open grassed habitats for feeding and nesting has also proved problematic for airport management as this attraction has resulted in them posing a serious aircraft bird-strike risk. Between October 1999 and September 2004, 37% of all bird strikes (or near misses) reported to the Civil Aviation Authority were spur-winged plovers.

In 2020, the increasing frequency of these occurrences along with a number of other complaints from a broad spectrum of the community finally led to the removal of their "Protected" status.

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
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

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

As the warmer months roll in and our district fills with holidaymakers, beachgoers, and the occasional overly enthusiastic reveller, it's the perfect time to brush up on a few important community safety matters. From trespass notices to alcohol bans, from beat cops to beach safety, here's everything you need to know to stay safe, informed, and on the right side of the law—preferably while wearing sunscreen.

Trespass Notices: What They Are (And Why You Can't Ignore Them)

A trespass notice is a formal instruction from a property occupier telling someone to leave—and stay gone—for up to two years. It's backed by the Trespass Act 1980, which helpfully reinforces the idea that "no, seriously, please leave" is not a negotiable suggestion.

How to Issue One (Gracefully, If Possible)

Verbal notice:

Simply tell the person to leave and not return. Strongly recommended: jot down the time, date, and who you spoke to—your memory may be perfect, but it never hurts to have receipts.

Written notice:

Clear, calm, and much harder for anyone to claim they "didn't get the memo." Prepare three copies—one for you, one for the trespasser, and one for the police. Serve it by hand, by courier, or via registered mail. If the person refuses the paper, you can still drop it at their feet with all the dignity of a courtroom drama.

Always Notify the Police

Once you've issued a notice, let the police know—online, at the station,



or by phone. If the person refuses to leave *right now*, takes the scenic route off the property, or decides to return for round two, dial 111 immediately.

Legal Consequences

Ignoring a properly served trespass notice can result in:

- * A fine of up to \$1,000
- * Up to three months' imprisonment
- * And possibly a stern lecture from a judge who also didn't want their day interrupted

Alcohol Bans: Knowing Where You Can (and Can't) Sip This Summer

Nothing says "holiday season" like sun, surf, and a cold drink—unless you're in a 24/7 alcohol-ban zone, in which case the only drink allowed is the bottle of water you should be consuming anyway.

Waihi Township - Permanent Alcohol Ban

A full-time alcohol prohibition applies everywhere within the 50 km/h zones. If the sign says *slow down*, it also means *put the drink down*.

Waihi Beach - Year-Round 24/7 Ban

The Alcohol Control Bylaw 2022 means no alcohol in public spaces—beaches, reserves, car parks, pathways—essentially anywhere you could plausibly picnic.

Hosting an Event?

Waihi town events may require

special permissions.

Waihi Beach events involving alcohol need a special licence.

Plan early—councils and paperwork go together like sunscreen and summer.

Beat Cops: New Faces Keeping the Peace

Waihi Police Station is welcoming extra beat officers for the busy summer period. You'll see them around the town centre, beachfronts, and parks—on foot or on bikes—bringing a friendly, visible presence to our community.

These officers help deter low-level offending, respond quickly to local issues, and generally make the place feel safer. Please say hello—they won't bite, and they're very good at pointing people towards the nearest functioning public toilet.

Waihi Police Station is open 9am–3pm weekdays, closed only on public holidays. For non-emergencies, call 105. For emergencies, dial 111.

Holiday Scams: 'Tis the Season to Be Wary

Scammers love Christmas even more than children do.

Remember:

- * NZ Police never issue fines by text or email.
- * There is no "Christmas bonus" payment for seniors (nice try, scammers).
- * Never click suspicious links or share personal details with someone who unexpectedly wants to "help you."

Report scams via the NZ Police

website or by calling 105.

Summer Water Safety: Because We'd Like Everyone to Go Home Again

Whether you're swimming at Waihi Beach, relaxing around rivers, or splashing in backyard pools, please remember:

- * Alcohol and water do not mix. If you wouldn't drive after drinking, don't swim either—it's one of summer's most preventable hazards.
- * Watch children constantly. "Just for a moment" is longer than you think.
- * Swim between the flags at patrolled beaches. Lifeguards are excellent at saving lives, but they prefer not to demonstrate those skills unnecessarily.
- * Know your limits. The ocean does not care how confident you felt before you ran into the water.
- * Use sunscreen. No, really. You are not invincible.

Let's Keep Our Community Safe

From respecting trespass notices to following alcohol bans, from greeting your local beat cops to staying alert for scams and staying cautious around water—our combined efforts help ensure Waihi and Waihi Beach remain safe, enjoyable places for residents and visitors alike.
